
























GYPSY SCAMS

The Wood Dale Police Department would like to remind residents that if a deal sounds too good to be true, it probably is! Yet, every day people get taken by such schemes as someone coming to the door who "just happened" to be walking or driving by, and noticed your home needs some repair. BEWARE! of door-to-door sellers of roof repairs, driveway repairs, seal coating, insulation or landscaping. Do not allow anyone you do not know into your home. Also, do not sign anything without a second opinion. Remember that high-pressure sales tactics can convince you to buy something you don't need or want. You do not have to open the door to anyone, especially if you're not expecting a visitor. Do not be afraid to SAY NO, and contact the Wood Dale Police Department at 630/766-2060 to report any suspicious activity in your neighborhood.



BACK TO SCHOOL SAFETY TIPS FOR MOTORISTS

Sharing the Road Safely With School Buses



School buses are one of the safest forms of transportation on the road today. In fact, according to the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration, riding a bus to school is 13 times safer than riding in a passenger vehicle and 10 times safer than walking to school. The reality

of school bus safety is that more children are hurt outside the bus than inside as passengers. Most of the children who lose their lives in bus-related crashes are pedestrians, 4 to 7 years old, who are hit by the bus or by motorists illegally passing a stopped school bus. For this reason, it is necessary to know the proper laws and procedures for sharing the road safely with school buses:

- The area 10 feet around a school bus is where children are in the most danger of being hit. Stop your car far enough from the bus to allow children the necessary space to safety enter and exit the bus.
- All 50 states require that traffic in both directions stop on undivided roadways when students are entering or exiting a school bus.
- Traffic behind a school bus traveling in the same direction as the bus must always stop. If it is a 4 lane road with 2 lanes of traffic going in the same direction (i.e. Irving Park), only the traffic traveling in the same direction as the bus must stop. If it is a 2 lane street, all traffic must stop.
- · School buses use yellow flashing lights to alert motorists that they are preparing to stop to load or unload children. Red flashing lights and an extended stop sign arm signals to motorists that the bus is stopped and children are getting on or off the bus.
- Be alert. Children walking to or from a bus are usually very comfortable with their surroundings. This makes them more likely to take risks, ignore hazards or fail to look both ways when crossing a street.
- Never pass a school bus on the right. This is illegal and could result in very tragic consequences.

Please continue to voice your complaints to the O'Hare Noise Compatibility Commission (ONCC) hotline at (800) 435-9569 or on their website at www.oharenoise.org. A form has been added for residents to voice their comments on our City website. Residents can document some of the other problems that have been noticed, for example, a film over the water at the top of pool or a plane so low that the landing lights are shining through the windows and waking up the kids.

The City is doing what we can to achieve relief from all this airplane noise, such as working with other Cities and Villages from both sides of the airport to put more pressure on the FAA to help resolve the problem.

What are the hours for voting?

6:00 a.m. – 7:00 p.m.

Can Alien residents vote?

No, you must be a U.S. Citizen and a registered voter.

Can I still vote if I misplaced by voter's ID card?

Yes, if you are a registered voter at your current address.

Can I vote at another County location, other that one listed on my voter's card?

No, registered voters may only vote at the location listed on your voter's card.

Will I need any identification when I vote?

No, unless you registered BY MAIL and failed to include the necessary identification with the registration.

Will I be given a receipt verifying how I voted?

No, a receipt is produced but kept in the machine as a permanent record and returned to the Election Authority.

Will I have to vote for every office?

No, you only the races you voted in will be counted.

Can I still vote after I have moved?

Yes, IF you move in the SAME PRECINCT within 27 days of an election and fill out the appropriate affidavit at your polling place.

Disposable wipe products are becoming increasingly popular due to their convenience. However, increased wipe usage is causing expensive problems for sanitary sewer systems. Even wipes labeled as "flushable" on the package do not break down enough to flow through the sanitary sewer, pumps and bar screens at wastewater treatment facilities. Disposable wipes are causing clogs which can damage pumps, cause premature failure of equipment and increase plant maintenance.

Most wipes on the market do not break down sufficiently to be considered dispersible and therefore; should not be flushed. However, manufacturers currently label products as "flushable" if they can pass through a home's plumbing system. The Association of Nonwoven Fabrics Industry (INDA) passed new guidelines for flush ability in June 2013. These guidelines require manufacturers to evaluate their wipes with a series of seven tests. Products not passing these tests will be repackaged with a "do not flush" logo by January 1, 2015. This is good news, but revised labels on wipes may not be enough to reduce clogging.

GUIDELINES FOR DRAINING SWIMMING POOLS

Your swimming pool is filled with chlorinated water. Chlorinated water discharged directly to surface waters (wetlands, lakes, streams, and rivers), roadways or storm sewers has an adverse impact on local water quality. High concentrations of chlorine, as are present in swimming pools, are toxic to wildlife and fish. Appropriate preparations should be made prior to draining down a pool during pool winterizing. It is recommended that one of the following measures be used:

De-chlorinate the water in the pool prior to draining. This can be done through mechanical or chemical means. These types of products are readily available at local stores.

Or,

- Drain the pool over a period of several days across your lawn using the following additional guidelines:
- 1) Allow pool water to sit at least 2 days while receiving a reasonable amount of sunlight, and without further addition of chlorine or bromine. It is recommended that the chlorine level be tested after 2 days to ensure that safe levels are met (below 0.1 mg/l).
- 2) Pool discharge should be directed across your lawn, not down your driveway or into nearby storm sewer inlets. Our storm sewer system leads directly to wetlands, streams, lakes or rivers.

These recommendations are based on guidance from the Illinois Environmental Protection Agency. Visit www.epa.state.il.us/water for additional information.

Community **Development** What Does The Community Development Department Do?

The Community Development provides services in the following areas:

Building oversees all residential, commercial, and industrial building construction within the City. They take in all permit applications, direct the plan review process and conduct reviews, issue permits, and conduct scheduled onsite inspections during all construction phases. They also take care of registering all contractors who work within the City limits and provide assistance during emergency situations and events.



Code Enforcement enforces the Unified Development Ordinance, Sign Ordinance, and applicable sections of the City Code dealing with nuisance control. Nuisances include weeds and tall grass, motor vehicles not in good driving condition, garbage and debris on private properties, and structures in disrepair. Enforcement activities include code violation investigation, issuance of citations, and processing for court action when necessary. It is the goal of this division to inform and work with residents on potential problems before other action is needed. This program helps to ensure that all of Wood Dale looks its best.

Economic Development serves as a liaison between the City and property owners, developers, and businesses that are looking for opportunities within the City limits. Economic Development also works closely with organizations that promote Wood Dale as a destination for business and tourism such as the Wood Dale Chamber of Commerce and Meet Chicago Northwest convention and visitors bureau.

Housing maintains our rental registration program. Owners of rental property must submit the registration form, consent form and fee. The inspector will then set up an inspection with either the tenant or landlord. Once inspection has been approved a Rental Certificate is issued. The registration is annual and the inspections are done every other year. This program is a valuable tool in maintaining the safety of existing buildings throughout the City.

Planning and Zoning ensures that properties are developed in accordance with the City's Unified Development Ordinance and Comprehensive Plan. They assist property owners and prospective businesses with zoning variations, special uses, and annexation requests. They are also responsible for the development and implementation of both immediate and long-range planning activities (such as strategic and area-based plans) and the City's geographic information systems. They also provide staff support for the City's Streetscape Committee.

Information for Wood Dale Businesses

Business License Renewal Information & Assistance

Generally, all business licenses expire on December 31st. Business license renewals are mailed to business owners the first week of November.

All Wood Dale businesses are responsible for the timely filing of annual business license renewal and renewal payments, which must be received or postmarked by December 31st**. Businesses failing to meet this deadline will incur a late payment penalty (See the Wood Dale's Municipal Code at www. wooddale.com business licenses fees and late fee schedule details. In addition:

- If your business closed in 2014, you must complete notify the City of Wood Dale in writing to close out your file. See the Renewal Form and Instructions for further information.
- If you sell your business, the new owner must file for a new Business License, and may be required to revise or file new permits. Business Licenses are not transferable to new business owners.

PERMIT & LICENSE REQUIREMENTS

• The City of Wood Dale has various requirements and regulation for operating a business. It is your responsibility to obtain all necessary approvals, permits, and licenses, and to pay all taxes and fees associated with your particular business.

Federal Identification Number

Businesses are required to obtain an Employer Identification Number (EIN) from the Internal Revenue Service (IRS). An application form (#SS-4) can be obtained at www.irs.gov.

Fire District donates two surplus vehicles



The Wood Dale Fire Protection District donated two surplus vehicles to the College of DuPage Fire Science program. A Ford E350 ambulance and Pierce Dash pumper engine. These vehicles will help educate and train EMT and Fire Science students the skills and knowledge required to be an EMT and/or Firefighter.

The EMT students will use the ambulance for training. These students will learn how to load and unload patients, make radio reports and other EMT scenarios. Fire Science students will use the engine to learn about hose loads and proper vehicle maintenance. The engine will also be hooked up to the hydrant on TCD's property for pumping water during cell burns. A "cell" is a wooden structure used to train student firefighters in fire extinguishing tactics.

The Wood Dale Fire Protection District is honored to donate these vehicles that will contribute in the education and training of future paramedics and firefighters.

Grades 3rd-5th Principal: Mr. Al Buttimer



STEM is a curriculum based on the idea of educating students in four specific areas – Science, Technology, Engineering and Mathematics. Rather than teach these four areas separately, STEM integrates them and designs lessons based on related real-world applications. The STEM teacher has the role of a guide and facilitator of learning, as instruction shifts from a traditional teacher directed approach to that of



To enhance the 21st Century learning environment for all students, Fenton High School is implementing a 1:1 Chromebook initiative at the start of the 2014 - 2015school year. Through the use of grant and Title 1 funding, every Fenton student will receive a Chromebook at no cost to students and their families. A Chromebook is a notebook computer and mobile device that runs in Google's cloud based operating system (Source: webopedia).

This comes to fruition after several years of research, planning and training. District 100 Board of Education members became familiar with 1:1 learning during an annual National School Board Convention while at the same time, school administrators were learning of this cutting edge advancement in student learning. As a result, research was conducted and several site visits to area high schools were planned. In the summer of 2013, a group of teachers received Chromebook training and during the 2013 - 2014 school year, 22 teachers and 600 students participated in a 1:1 Chromebook pilot program.

"I really enjoyed the Chromebooks," stated Fenton student, Remington Bedova. "It was a great addition. Teachers can comment and edit with google docs and give insight into your work." Remington participated in the pilot program during his American Heritage and Environmental Sciences courses at Fenton.

To ensure a smooth transition, all parents along with their student(s) were required to attend an informational meeting and sign an acceptable use form. Fenton High School District 100 has enabled filters for safety purposes which will be activated in the building and off campus as well.
