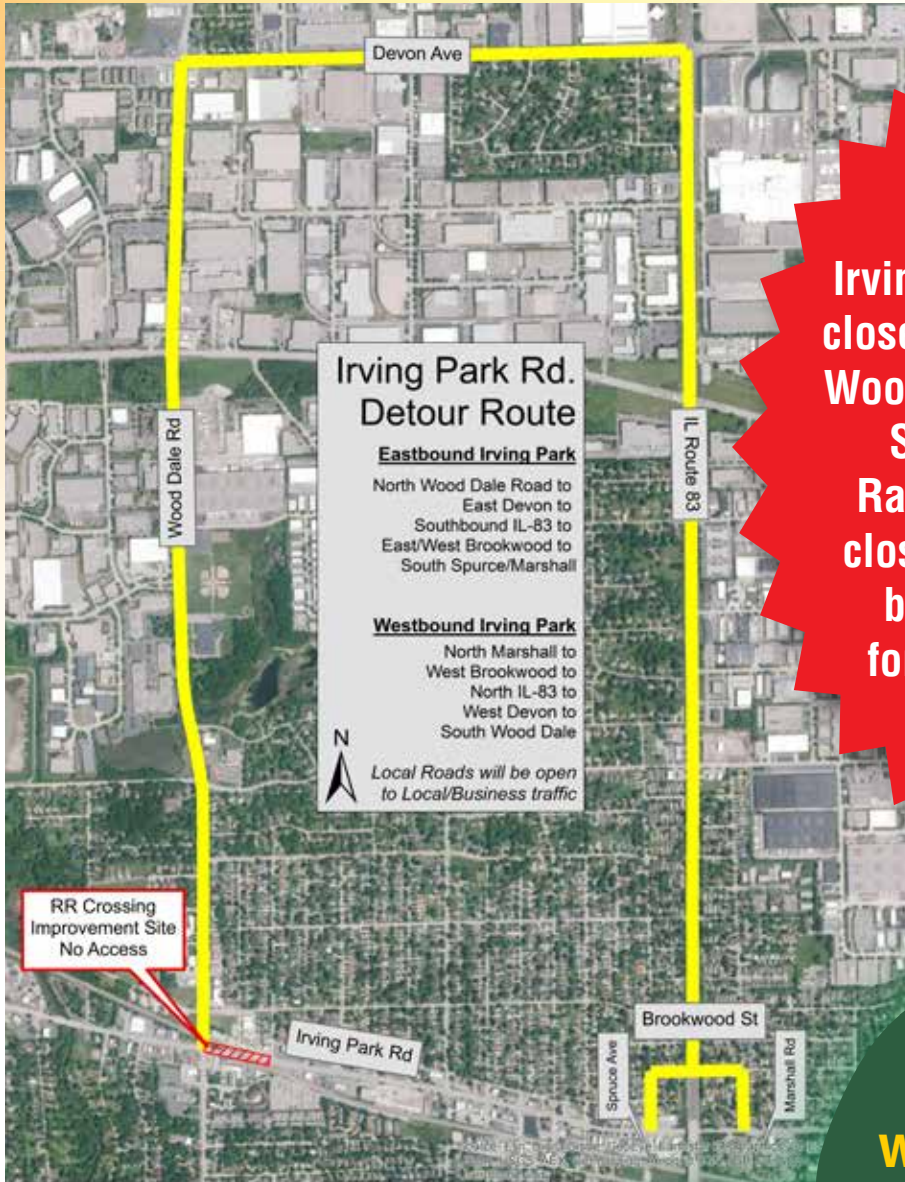
Also, please be courteous to your neighbors and keep your garbage cans hidden from their windows as well as the street which is against City Code.

New Resident Information

Online Services

The City of Wood Dale website www.wooddale.com provides these popular services: Streaming Video of City Meetings, Wood Dale Community and Business Notification Program, and the City's' complete Municipal Code. We welcome your, comments and suggestions!

Vehicle Stickers

All vehicles which have license plates registered to Wood Dale addresses must purchase and display Wood Dale Vehicle Stickers within 30 days of becoming a resident in Wood Dale. Contact the Finance Department for more information 630-766-4900.

Waste Collections

The City sanitation services are provided by Republic Services. Homes located West of Wood Dale Road (except for Bristol Park) are picked up on Monday. Homes located East of Wood Dale Road and Bristol Park are picked up on Tuesday.

When your scheduled collection day occurs on one of the six following holidays; New Year's Day, Memorial Day, Independence Day, Labor Day, Thanksgiving Day and Christmas Day, your collection will be delayed by one day.

Yard Waste

Our garbage company Republic picks up yard waste weekly beginning the first Monday of April through the last Monday of November on your regularly scheduled waste pickup day (Monday or Tuesday). Yard waste must be collected separately from household waste. Residents can either place yard waste in brown bags, or a garbage can marked with a City yard waste sticker. For more information on how to obtain a yard waste sticker please call the Clerk's Office at (630) 787-3709.

Reminder **Yard Waste** is not Brush Pickup and it only accounts for small twigs, leaves, and grass trimmings. For bigger branch pickup please refer to our Citywide Brush program information.

Recycling

The City of Wood Dale contracts with Republic Services handle recycling. Recycling bins are emptied on the same day as refuse is collected.

Addison Township Highway Department offers electronic recycling on the 2nd Saturday of every month April through November from 8am-12pm.

Freedom of Information Request

Residents and businesses wishing to review City documents can file a request for a Freedom of Information Form with the City Clerk. All requests for information are processed in accordance with the requirements of the Illinois Freedom of Information Act.

Register to Vote

If you have not registered to vote or have changed addresses, voter registration services are available at City Hall. Please bring two valid forms of identification and a utility bill proving residency. The registration is located on the second floor of City Hall in the Clerk's Office.

City Government

Council meetings are held at 7:30 PM on the first and third Thursdays of each month. Committee of the Whole meetings are held at 7:30 PM the second and fourth Thursdays of the month.

Community Development Commission meetings are held at 7:30 PM on the third Monday of each month. The public is invited and encouraged to attend.

All meetings are taped and broadcasted on local access television channels 6/99 and can be viewed online.

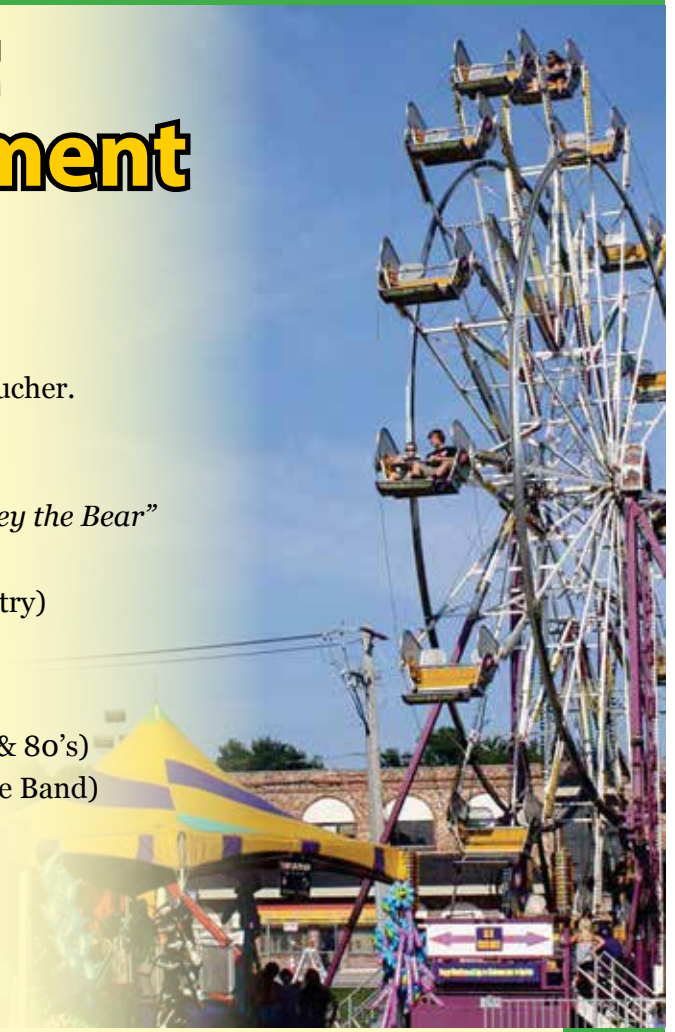

Safety

Summer is finally upon us and the heat is on! Where there is fun in the sun, there must be safety as well. Make a splash with pool safety reminders.

Installing a Pool:

If you're thinking about installing a pool this summer, here are some things to keep in mind:

-  **PERMIT REQUIREMENTS:** Any structure that contains water over 24-inches for recreational bathing is a pool, which requires a permit before installation.
-  **RESTRICTING ACCESS:** All pools must be completely enclosed by a fence or a barrier that is at least 4-feet in height. Gates must be self-closing and self-latching. Where an above-ground pool structure is used as a barrier or where the barrier is mounted on top of the pool structure, the ladder or steps shall be capable of being secured, locked up or removed to prevent access.
-  **ELECTRICAL SAFETY:** Overhead power lines must be 10-feet from the edge of the pool; underground lines must be 5-feet away. A "ground fault locking type" receptacle for the pool pump may be installed 6- to 10-feet from the edge of the pool. This receptacle must be equipped with an approved "in-use cover". NO extension cords are permitted. An electric permit is also required which should include manufacturer's specifications on the pool and pool equipment. Pumps and heaters must be U.L. listed.

ABCs of Pool Safety:

Pools are a fun way to cool off during the dog days of summer. Once a pool is installed, it is important to remember some key tips to ensure the fun lasts:

- A. ADULT SUPERVISION** – Never leave children unattended.
- B. BARRIERS** – Put physical barriers and alarm devices in place. Fences are a building code requirement but also consider pool covers/nets and pool/door alarms.
- C. CHEMICAL STORAGE** – Store pool chemicals out of reach of children. Always read and follow manufacturer's instructions for use.
- D. DRAIN SAFETY** – Don't let anyone play on or near drains and ensure drain covers are properly installed. Make sure everyone using the pool knows where the emergency shut-off switch is located and how to use it.
- E. EMERGENCY PREPAREDNESS** – Take water safety, CPR and first aid classes to be prepared for an emergency.

Public Works

Flooding

Flooding Safety:

- **Do not drive through a flooded area.** More people drown in cars than anywhere else. Do not drive around barriers.
- **Do not walk through flowing water.** Currents can be deceptive, and six inches of water can knock you off your feet.
- **Stay away from power lines and electrical wires.** Electrical currents can travel through water. Electrocutation is the 2nd leading cause of death during floods.
- **Be alert to gas leaks.** Turn off the gas to your house prior to it flooding. If you smell gas dial 911, and have the Fire Department respond. If you smell gas do not use lanterns or anything with an open flame.
- **Keep children away from the flood waters, ditches, culverts and storm drains.**
- **Clean everything that has been flooded.**
- **Do not use gas engines, such as generators, or charcoal fires indoors.**



Property Protection Measures:

- Watertight seals can be applied to brick and block walls to protect against low level flooding.
- Electrical boxes, furnaces, air conditioners, washers and dryers should be moved to a higher floor.
- Move furniture and valuables to a higher floor, and sand bag the exterior openings. The City will dispatch sandbags prior to the event in the following locations: 136 Forest View, 232 Forest View, Potter St between Edgebrook and Oakwood, and 408 Grove St.

The City of Wood Dale will assist you by continually keeping ditches, streams and inlets debris free to improve flow capacity, and reduce the risk of flooding.

The City offers a service through NOAH so residents can monitor Salt Creek water levels, at 630-733-6624. Automated alerting by phone will be done when it reaches the flood level of 674.5. The City would like to remind you that flood insurance is mandatory if you live in the floodplain if you use a federally regulated insured bank for mortgaging. Flood insurance information can be obtained at FloodSmart.gov, or 1-800-427-2419.

Brush Removal Dates

The remaining dates are: July 18th, September 19th and October 14th. Yard debris pick up runs April through November, and will be picked up on your garbage day.

FREE MULCH:
The City has free mulch available at 444 Potter St., located near the intersection of Potter and Station.

Stormwater Committee

12 Tips to Prevent Storm Water Pollution

Remember to turn off your sprinklers when it rains to avoid water runoff; during winter runoff can freeze causing slippery conditions.

Bag your pet's waste—don't just leave it there. Leaving pet waste on the ground increases public health risks by allowing harmful bacteria and nutrients to wash into the storm drain and eventually into local water bodies.

Don't apply pesticides, fertilizers and herbicides before it rains. Contrary to popular belief, the rain won't help to soak these chemicals into the ground; it will only help create polluted runoff into our local creeks.

Select native and adapted plants and grasses that are drought and pest resistant. Native plants require less water, fertilizer, and pesticides.

Reduce the amount of paved area and increase the amount of vegetated area in your yard.

If you change your car's oil, don't dump it on the ground or in the storm drain; dispose of it properly at an oil recycling center.

Check your car, boat, or



motorcycle for leaks. Clean up spilled fluids with an absorbent material, don't rinse the spills into the storm drain.

Don't get rid of grass clippings and other yard waste by dumping it or sweeping it into the storm drain; this will cause depleted oxygen for aquatic life. Instead, compost your yard waste.

When washing your car at home, wash with only water or use biodegradable soap and wash it on a lawn or other unpaved surface; better yet take your car to a professional car wash.

Don't get rid of old or unused paint by throwing it down the storm drain; dispose of paint and other household hazardous waste

at recycling facilities.

Don't pump your pool water into the storm drain pool chemicals can be hazardous to our creek habitats. Whenever possible, drain your pool into the sanitary sewer system where it can be treated.

Throw litter away in a garbage can, not out your window. Recycle what you can!

Sales Tax Reduction

Effective as of June 1, 2016 the sales tax rate has decreased by 0.25% for retailers doing business in Wood Dale. This is due to the elimination of the sales tax for the DuPage Water Commission.

According to the Illinois Department of Revenue, this change will affect sales of general merchandise or items that are titled or registered by an agency of Illinois state government and who are located within unincorporated DuPage County or any municipality served by the DuPage Water Commission.

What does this mean to retailers?

If this applies to you, adjust your cash registers and computer programs to reflect the reduced rate. Refer to additional details at Illinois Department of Revenue (<http://www.revenue.state.il.us/Publications/Bulletins/2016/FY-2016-09.pdf>).

What does this mean to consumers?

You will pay less in taxes for general merchandise purchased through Wood Dale merchants, which means extra money in your pockets.

Sign Code Amendments

Effective as of May 5, 2016 the City Council approved amendments to the Sign Code to provide opportunities for additional exposure for Wood Dale businesses. The following is a summary of the changes approved:

- Increased wall sign allowance based on the setback of the building
- Introduction of a tollway sign for properties along the Elgin O'Hare Expressway
- Increased number of times that temporary signs can be displayed
- Expanded allowance to install branded directional signage

Each July 4th, thousands of people, most often children and teens, are injured while using consumer fireworks. Despite the dangers of fireworks, few people understand the associated risks - devastating burns, other injuries, fires, and even death. Leave fireworks to the professionals. Do not use consumer fireworks. Consumer fireworks include sparklers and fire crackers. The tip of a sparkler burns at a temperature more than 1,200 degrees Fahrenheit, which is hot enough to cause third-degree burns. The safest way to enjoy fireworks is to attend a public display conducted by trained professionals. After the firework display, children should never pick up fireworks that may be left over, they may still be active.

LIGHTNING SAFETY

Thunder and lightning storms happen all the time. Know what to do to keep you and your family safe when it does strike!

OUTDOOR SAFETY TIPS

If you can hear thunder, you are within striking distance of lightning. Look for shelter inside a home, large building, or a hard topped vehicle right away. Do not go under tall trees for shelter.

Stay away from windows and doors.

If you are in or on open water, go to land and seek shelter immediately.

If a person is struck by lightning, call 9-1-1 and get medical care immediately. Lightning strike victims carry no electrical charge; attend to them immediately. Check their breathing, heartbeat, and pulse. CPR may be needed.

INDOOR SAFETY TIPS

Unplug appliances and other electrical items, like computers, and turn off air conditioners. If you are unable to unplug them, turn them off. Stay off corded phones, computers, and other electronic equipment that put you in direct contact with electricity or plumbing. Avoid washing your hands, bathing, doing laundry, or washing dishes.

Birth to 3 Screenings: Supporting Our Youngest Learners at ECEC



The Early Childhood Center has been providing services for infants and toddlers since 1987; just one year after the State of Illinois began to offer early learning grants to school districts. There is strong research to demonstrate that supporting our youngest learners, as early as possible, makes a significant difference in later outcomes for them. Research also documents that children's brains are being shaped and stimulated before birth and that by age 5 years, approximately 80% of a child's brain is developed. It makes sense that the State Board of Education would see the value of supporting high quality programming for the very young.

ECEC offers the Born To Learn Curriculum through the Parent As Teachers Program to families that meet our criteria. Our program offers free screenings to all families: (developmental, social/emotional, as well as hearing and vision screening). For families that qualify, the youngsters receive two 1-hour home sessions that focus on a particular developmental area monthly. OAKBROOK SCHOOL

Grades K-2nd

Second graders at Oakbrook School had the opportunity to learn about resources in the community. In this unit of study, students gained knowledge about the business needs in their neighborhood, for instance a pet store, a family entertainment center, a sports center, a pastry shop and more. Students learned how to be an entrepreneur by collaborating with others. They were asked to create a plan which included: 1) a name for their business, 2) deciding to sell goods or services, 3) writing an advertisement, 4) developing a logo; 5) recording their own commercial. Students also had the chance to present their business to their classmates. Lastly, students explained how their business helped the community.



Second grade Bilingual teacher, Mrs. Macias, wanted to take this further by inviting her students' parents into the classroom to share information about their businesses with her students. Mrs. Macias' idea was to help students gain a better understanding of how a real business operates.

One of the parents that came to share her business with the class was Betty Escobar. Mrs. Escobar was proud and excited to speak about her business. She explained what she does, the services her business provides, what a typical day is like, and how her hard work and dedication has helped the company flourish. She also explained how the business helps society. It was evident that businesswomen and men wear many hats. She did a wonderful job helping the students develop a deeper understanding of how a business is run and how businesses help the community.

WESTVIEW SCHOOL

Grades 3rd-5th

Principal: Mr. Al Buttimer

For each of the last two years, Westview School has sponsored an opportunity specially designed for our female students in 5th grade: Girls on the Run! Students are invited to participate in the program based on teacher recommendations. The group aims to inspire girls to be joyful, healthy and confident, using a fun, experience-based curriculum which creatively integrates running.

Members of the club work together as a team to train to run a regional 5K (3.1 miles) race in the late spring. Along the way, faculty sponsors facilitate lessons that focus on having a positive self-image, developing confidence and assertiveness skills, as well as setting goals and designing a plan to meet their goals.

During the last few months of school, the group meets during their lunch/recess period, as well as after school a few days per week. The group is led by Mrs. Kelly Marks, School Social Worker, and Mrs. Mariah Cericola, 5th Grade Teacher. Once the group is underway, members form a bond with one another with hopes of maintaining a network of support as they transition into adolescence. We are proud of our Girls on the Run and are eager to see where running may take them!

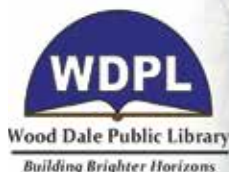

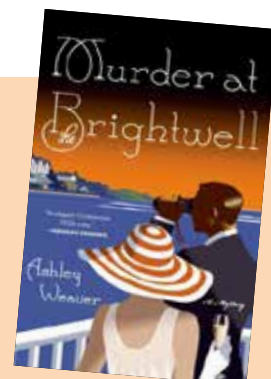

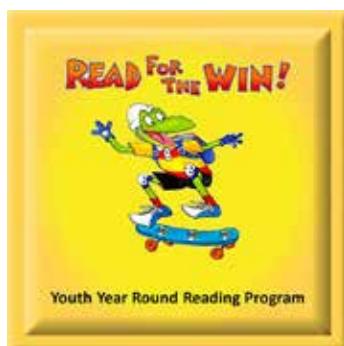
Lifelong Learning Online
