#### THE CITY OF WOOD DALE ROAD PROGRAM

This summer, the City's Road Resurfacing Program will commence. The number of roads included in the program has increased nearly three times, thanks to grant funding from the Illinois Department of Commerce and Economic Opportunity. While most of the work consists of a grind and overlay process, several streets in Wood Dale will be reconstructed. There will also be minor stormwater and water main improvements in specific locations. Pictured are the planned improvement areas. Notifications regarding the scheduled areas of work will be shared with residents before the start of improvements. The City is excited to provide these improvements to the community as it enhances the quality of life in Wood Dale. #### COMMERCIAL & RECREATIONAL VEHICLE PARKING REGULATIONS

The City of Wood Dale allows for the storage of up to one commercial or recreational vehicle on residential property at any given time. Additional vehicles may be stored within a fully enclosed garage. For full regulations, please see the full Municipal Code excerpt at www.wooddale.com.



#### COMMERCIAL VEHICLES

One per residence/residential unit unless enclosed in a garage. May be parked on the driveway, rear-yard or side-yard. No vehicles that exceed a "D" plate. Must not exceed 7 in height for open bed trucks or 9 for enclosed vans, 7 in width and 22 in length.



#### COMMERCIAL TRAILERS

One per residence/residential unit unless enclosed in a garage. May be parked on the driveway, rear-yard or side-yard.



#### RECREATIONAL VEHICLES

One per residence/residential unit unless enclosed in a garage. May be parked on the driveway, rear-yard or side-yard on a pad of concrete, asphalt or paving that extends to the exterior dimensions of the vehicle.



#### RECREATIONAL TRAILERS

One per residence/residential unit unless enclosed in a garage. May be parked on the driveway, rear-yard or side-yard.

## BRUSH COLLECTION VS YARD WASTE WHAT'S THE DIFFETZENCE?

Oftentimes there are questions or confusion between the City's Yard Waste Collection Program and the Brush Collection Program. The City manages the Brush Collection while Flood Brothers is contracted to collect Yard Waste. Below are some general guidelines for both programs.

#### BRUSH COLLECTION:

The City's Curbside Brush Collection program is a service offered to Wood Dale residents to assist them with their landscape maintenance. The program is designed to dispose of large branches and tree limbs that cannot be collected through regular refuse collection. Curbside Brush Collection is available from April to November. In order to maintain program efficiency, the following guidelines are strictly adhered to:

- ▶ Brush or trees trimmed by private contractors will <u>not</u> be removed.
- ▶ Branches must be 2 to 8 inches in diameter and can be up to 15 feet in length. Neatly stack all branches at the curb.
- ▶ Branches smaller than 2 inches in diameter must be securely tied into bundles with twine. Branches smaller than 2 feet in length must be disposed of in a waste container or yard waste bag.
- No leaves will be accepted. Leaves are considered yard waste, which is a separate program.
- Large roots must be removed from any brush and put into your yard waste container.

#### Remaining 2022 Brush Collection Dates:

July 11 • September 12 October 17 • November 28

Branches and limbs must be on the curb by 6:30 A.M. on the Monday of each collection week. Brush will then be collected throughout the week as the contractor advances street by street.

#### YATED WASTE COLLECTION:

The yard waste collection service is offered each year from April 1 through November 30 by Flood Brothers. Please note the following guidelines.

- ► Each acceptable container must be properly designated with a yard waste decal, which means that it has a yard waste decal securely and visibly affixed. Decals are supplied by the City, and you may pick one up at City Hall. As an exception, paper yard waste bags may be used but do not need decals.
- ► Flood Brothers will collect brush and tree trimmings as long as the materials are bundled and secured with biodegradable twine and no more than four (4) feet in length and fifty (50) pounds in weight.
- In addition to bundles, containers also cannot exceed four (4) feet in length.
- ► Each branch must be less than two (2) inches in diameter, with the total diameter of the bundle not to exceed eighteen (18) inches.
- Bags/containers cannot contain unacceptable materials such as refuse or dirt.
- Bags/containers cannot weigh more than fifty (50) pounds.
- Flood Brothers has yard waste approved carts available for an additional monthly rental cost. Please contact Flood Brothers to arrange for a cart at (630) 261-0578.

Throughout the summer months, the City's Public Works Utilities Division flushes watermain lines through the fire hydrants. This process has several benefits to the water distribution system. Some of these benefits include verification of proper hydrant operation, confirms the available flow to the hydrants, allows for the delivery of the highest quality water to all areas of the City, and removes mineral and sediment build up from the water main lines. Streets signs will be placed in various areas of the City in an effort to notify everyone of the work occurring. ## CITY OF WOOD DALE TREE PLANTING

Trees are beneficial in so many ways. They help reduce pollution, they capture carbon dioxide and release oxygen, give us privacy and increase the value of our property. Trees can cool our house during the summer, and help retain the warmth inside our houses during winter. Trees also help decrease our energy costs and even provide shelter and are a food source for birds and animals. With that in mind here are a few things to keep in mind when selecting a tree for planting.

- What are you looking for in a tree? Do you want a flowering tree, a shade tree, one that produces fruit, do you want to attract birds, butterflies, or wildlife, or just purely for ornamental purposes?
- » It's suggested to visit a variety of neighborhoods, and see what trees are growing, or thriving in the area.
- » Do research on the type of tree such as: what strength of sun is needed in order to thrive, how much space is needed to plant, and how tall will it be fully grown.
- When considering where to place the tree consider several things to avoid such as the distance from the house, any over hangings, and any utilities in the area by calling JULIE to locate underground pipes and wires. JULIE's phone number is, 1-800-892-0123.
- » Before purchasing the tree always read the informational tree tag attached to verify all the trees care information.
- » Planting is best done in the fall when the weather is cool so there is less stress on the new planting. And it should be done before the first frost.

The Public Works Department has a parkway tree planting program that occurs each fall. Residents who desire to have a tree added to their parkway for FREE can call Public Works to be added to the list. The City's Arborist will determine the species best suited for your parkway location based on surroundings and room for growth. Trees can be requested at any time. Heatstroke is a medical emergency caused by your body temperature going too high. If you don't cool down guickly enough, you can die or have brain or organ damage.

- Heatstroke happens when you're very hot and your body doesn't cool itself properly
- Your temperature is usually over 104° F (40° C)
- Heatstroke can affect older people or young children who live without air conditioning
- Athletes and people working hard in high heat are also at risk for heatstroke
- Without treatment, about 80% of people with heatstroke die

Call an ambulance right away if someone is having symptoms of heatstroke. While waiting for the ambulance, get the person out of the sun

#### You can get heatstroke from:

- Working or exercising hard when it's hot
- Being locked in a hot car
- Being inside a hot room for a few days

It can take only a few hours of work or exercise in the heat to get heatstroke, especially if your body hasn't gotten used to the heat.

Children who are locked in a car (or who are too

young to open the door) in the hot sun can get heatstroke and die in less than an hour. Cars heat up very quickly inside, especially in the sun.

Older people who are shut in a hot room in the summer for a few days can get heatstroke even if the room doesn't seem really hot. Their body gradually gets overloaded by the heat.

#### **Providing Hands-On Experiences**

Providing students with hands-on experiences is an important feature of a high quality early childhood program. During our nature study this past spring, ECEC teachers and students had the opportunity to collaborate with the Wood Dale Public Library. In this study, one of the focus questions was, "How do animals grow and change?" At the time, the public library had eggs in an incubator, which days later would hatch. We had to see them!

When our students visited the library to see the eggs, they sang songs and listened to books being read about chickens. Shortly after, the students lined up and took a peek at the eggs in the incubator. They learned that the incubator kept them warm and that each egg needed to be rotated so that the baby chick inside could grow and become strong enough to break the eggshell and come out. Our students were intrigued and excited to see the baby chicks once they were born.

In the classroom, the students learned about the life cycle of the chicken and read fiction and non-fiction books about chickens. This study was also supported by watching real caterpillars and plants grow and change as living things do in nature. All living



things were well taken care of by our teachers and students. The butterflies were safely released into nature, and the baby chicks from the library were taken to a farm where they could live happy and healthy lives. When you see ECEC students, feel free to ask them "what comes first, the chicken or the egg? I am sure they will be able to give you a well-informed answer.

#### Westview Girls Group Teaches Much More than Running

This past spring, 15 girls in 5th grade participated in a special extracurricular club called Girls on the Run. Westview School's club is a local chapter of a much larger group. Girls on the Run, a national non-profit organization, designs programming that strengthens third-to eighth grade girls' social, emotional, physical and behavioral skills to successfully navigate life experiences. The program's curriculum places an emphasis on developing competence, confidence, connection, character, caring, and contribution in young girls through lessons that incorporate running and other physical activities. The life skills curriculum is delivered by two coaches who are also staff members at Westview.

Melissa Villa, a 5th Grade Dual Language Teacher and Lauren O'Brien, a Special Education Teacher have teamed up to support the 15 girls through a series of activities designed to build confidence while simultaneously training to complete a 5K run (3.1 miles). The group meets twice a week mid-day during the recess period. Most activities at that time focus on team-building during which the girls support one another, practice and strengthen social skills, while having fun! During the after school sessions twice a week, the girls focus on developing healthy habits, including lessons on nutrition, positive sleep habits, and exercise, with physical activities that slowly build in intensity to increase strength, flexibility, and endurance prior to race day.



Students from Westview's Girls on the Run Club learned valuable life skills, and trained to participate in a 5K race in early June.

This year's group participated in the "Cosley Zoo Run for the Animals" on June 4th in Wheaton, IL. Each girl invited a family member or other special adult to be a Running Buddy. The focus during the run was on pacing, and continually moving forward!

The girls report that participating in Girls on the Run is, "Amazing," and "Awesome." They point out that they enjoy learning about fun ways to exercise, why it is important to take good care of themselves, and strategies for solving problems with friends. Westview School has hosted a local Girls on the Run Club on and off for the past several years, and hopes to continue the tradition of providing girls with this productive learning experience that can influence positive habits for life!
