CRIMINAL TRESPASS TO STATE SUPPORTED LAND CONSUMPTION OF ALCOHOL BY MINOR CRIMINAL DAMAGE TO PROPERTY CASE #10-06750

**Wood Dale, IL** – On May 24, 2010 at approximately 12:57am, the Wood Dale Police Department responded to a burglar alarm call at Oakbrook Elementary School, located at 170 S. Wood Dale Road. Upon arrival, responding officers observed several suspects running in the hallways of the school. Officers worked to secure a perimeter around the school and were assisted by officers from Addison, Bensenville, Itasca, and the Schaumburg K-9 unit. After about 15 minutes, two suspects surrendered voluntarily and were taken into custody. Upon learning that a third suspect was still in the school, the K-9 unit was used on-leash to find the suspect, who was then taken into custody without incident.

Further investigation revealed that the suspects entered the school through a window and their intent was to rearrange some of the furniture as part of a senior prank. They had also been consuming alcohol at an unknown location prior to entering the school.

All three suspects were charged with Criminal Trespass to Land and Consumption of Alcohol by a Minor. In addition, Daniel Eggert was also charged with Criminal Damage to Property. All charges are Class A Misdemeanors. The suspects were later released on bond and given a court date of June 28, 2010 at the DuPage County Courthouse.
