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MAYOR'S LETTER



Dear Wood Dale Residents,

As we get close to the end of another year, I'd like to take a moment and reflect on the quality of life improvements we have made in the community.

One of the many improvements includes


becoming greener and more sustainable. The City recently hosted the 12th annual Green Fair. With each Green Fair event, we assist residents with safely shredding documents to prevent identity theft. We also collected an estimated 8,740 lbs. of electronics recycling. We often fill 2 truckloads of older, non-functional electronics, which is impressive because it means the community understands that by recycling old, unusable electronics, we divert those items from landfills and prevent toxic chemicals from leaching into the soil, polluting the groundwater and the air.

The Green Fair event happens because of the efforts of the Wood Dale for a Greener Tomorrow Committee, which exists to protect, sustain and improve a healthful environment to benefit present and future generations of Wood Dale.

We continue to collect old holiday lights and tattered American flags (to dispose of properly) at City Hall. We also encourage residents to drop off their expired prescription medicine. If you

missed this opportunity at the Green Fair, know that

the City maintains a RxBox for disposing of the medication safely at City Hall. By dropping off unused medication, you prevent possible household poisoning and



Caring for our community does not stop there. In addition to providing recycling events. we've planted over 60 trees throughout the town in one year (see page 10 for our latest effort) and participated in a green electricity aggregation program. We continue building a relationship with S.C.A.R.C.E. (School & Community Assistance for Recycling and Composting Education) to improve our sustainability practices. The City has also recently partnered with the Illinois Department of Natural Resources (IDNR) Office of Water Resources to purchase properties along the Salt Creek floodplain. This effort is supported by the IDNR as part of a grant award the City applied for totaling \$1,118,000, and they covered 100% of the purchase cost. The structures on these properties will be demolished, and the land restored back to a natural state. This helps with stormwater issues and creates more open green space in the community.

In November, we honor and celebrate all veterans for Veterans Day. The Park District generously hosts a breakfast for all Wood



Dale veterans and their families on November 5 from 8:30 to 10:30 a.m. at Salt Creek Golf Club. This event is sponsored by Itasca Bank & Trust. This year at the breakfast, we will be "retiring" the 2021 Veterans' banners, which will include a brief speech. All present 2021 Veteran banner participants will receive their banner and a certificate from the City. A ceremony follows at

Veterans Memorial Park at 11 a.m. We hope you have noticed the Veterans' Banners on display along Irving Park Road. The VFW is also hosting a Veterans Day ceremony on November 11. 

City of Wood Dale Partners with the Morton Arboretun

The City of Wood Dale and Morton Arboretum partnered to plant 60 trees, all donated by the Morton Arboretum, as part of their Chicago Region of Trees Initiative to get more trees planted in nearby communities this year.

In September, volunteers from the Morton Arboretum and Wood Dale Public Works Department worked together to get 50 of the trees planted along Charmille Lane and on the banks of the detention basin just west of Addison Road between Carter Court and Gilbert Drive. Ten additional trees were also planted in May along Oak Meadows Drive.

Included in this tree planting effort, the Arboretum provides certified arborists on site to detail proper ways to plant, prune and maintain the trees in good health. CITY OF WOOD DALE



The City of Wood Dale Public Works Department has its snow removal equipment ready to keep the City's streets clear for another winter. With everyone doing their part, snow removal can be completed in a timely manner. The faster the streets are cleared of snow, the sooner fire and police personnel have unhampered access to homes and businesses in case of an emergency.

- Parking on streets forty-eight (48) hours following a 2" or greater snowfall is prohibited.
- Snow Shoveled or plowed from driveways should be placed on the parkway, not in the street. Throwing snow back in the street is a traffic hazard, which is against the law. Be courteous to your neighbors by clearing snow from the sidewalk in front of your home. Children would like to utilize the sidewalks to avoid additional hazards of walking in the streets during snowy weather.
- ➤ Please understand that there are over 4,000 driveways in Wood Dale. It is not possible to clear each driveway after plowing your street. It violates the municipal code to deposit snow from driveways, parking lots, or private property onto the street or sidewalks. To help prevent the plow from dumping unnecessary amounts of snow in your driveway, always shovel or blow the snow to the left of your driveway; unless your driveway abuts your neighbor's driveway, then refrain from depositing snow anywhere other than your property.
- Please do not deposit snow on or around fire hydrants.
- ▼ The City has established a priority plowing system and snow removal routes. The main streets in the community will be cleared first, followed by local streets, cul de sacs, alleys, and sidewalks on state and county roads, in that order. We cannot change the priority of snow removal.
- Private streets and parking areas in multi-family planned unit developments or private streets in industrial areas will not be plowed by the City of Wood Dale. Snow removal in these areas is the responsibility of a private contractor hired by the property owner's association.

Above all, please be patient and drive carefully. The City will do its best to clear all streets as soon as possible. Please keep as much distance as possible from snow removal equipment. They are watching the plow and may not see you. The driver also may have limited visibility due to snowy conditions. Your cooperation is greatly appreciated to expedite snow removal.

If you wish to report an icy street that needs additional attention, please contact the Public Works Department, 630-350-3530, between 8 a.m. and 4 p.m. Monday through Friday. After hours, please contact the Wood Dale Police Department at 630-766-2060.

FROZEN PIPES

What are some common reasons for frozen pipes?

Water pipes will usually be more susceptible to freezing when the outdoor air temperature is below freezing for more than a few days. Special attention should be given when the outdoor air temperature does not rise above zero degrees during the daytime hours.

Some reasons include:

- Unheated basement where the water meter and pipes are located.
- 2. Un-insulated pipes which are against outside walls.
- 3. Open windows near the water meters or pipes.
- 4. Openings or cracks which allow cold outside air near the water meter or pipes.
- Water meter or pipes enclosed or boxed in against the outside wall.

How do I know if my pipes are frozen?

Generally, when a pipe that feeds a certain fixture such as a shower, sink, or toilet freezes, you will no longer be able to get water through that fixture. This will be the case if the pipe is frozen solid.

Why do frozen water pipes break?

When water freezes within a pipe, the volume of the water expands. The same amount of water takes up more space as a solid than a liquid. This causes the pipes to expand and possibly break at a weak point. This may not be noticed immediately. However, the pipes may thaw from the inside-out with the pipe actually breaking only when the full water pressure is restored.

Do only pipes inside the house freeze?

No. Not only is your inside plumbing susceptible to freezing, but your water service could also be subject to freezing. This is caused by frost in the ground encasing your service in ice, thereby freezing your service. This is especially typical of shallow (less than five feet deep) services.

What is a water service?

Water service is a pipe that begins with a connection to the water main in the city right-of-way. This pipe was designed solely to deliver fresh water to your home plumbing fixtures (i.e., sinks, toilets, showers, etc.) This line has valves on it to allow your water to be turned on or off.

Where are my shutoff valves?

There are actually two major shutoff valves in line with your service. The first valve, called a curb stop, is generally located in the parkway and is normally housed by a cylinder with a cap on it called the Buffalo Box or "B Box" for short. The other major valve is located in the home next to the water meter. Other valves may be near plumbing appliances such as sinks and toilets.

Should I maintain my main shutoff valve?

Keeping your main valve in good working condition will assure you that you can turn your water off in the event of an emergency, in case one of your water pipes break, for example. Olderstyle gate valves should be turned periodically due to possible corrosion build-up. Newer Teflon-coated ball valves should stay in working order without any regular turning.

What should I do if my pipes freeze?

If your pipes freeze, there are some procedures that you can follow to thaw them. The quicker that the problem is recognized, the better chance that damage will be minimized.

Some techniques for thawing frozen pipes include:

- 1. If possible, expose a boxed-in area to the inside heat. An example includes opening some ceiling tiles if your home has a drop ceiling.
- 2. Use a hair dryer.
- 3. DO NOT use torches to thaw pipes!
- 4. Rubbing the pipes with warm damp rags may slowly thaw the line.

How can I prevent my pipes from freezing?

There are many ways to help prevent your water pipes from freezing in extreme weather.

Some suggestions include:

- 1. Keeping the water meter area or pipes exposed to outside walls heated.
- 2. Providing ventilation to pipes allowing warmer air to circulate around them.
- 3. Insulating your pipes.
- 4. Caulking and sealing any openings near your water pipes.
- 5. Keeping some tap water running. (Moving water is more difficult to freeze, understanding, however, this will affect your bill.)
- 6. In severe cases, it is best to turn your main valve off and drain your system by turning your sinks on. This way, there will be no water in your pipes to freeze. Even if your pipes have not frozen in the past, severe cold can cause electricity blackouts and thereby disable your furnace. Your home can then become closer to the outdoor temperature very quickly. Draining your system will ensure that your pipes do not freeze. This is normally done if no one will be home for an extended period in extreme weather.



It is with great sadness that we share the news with our community of the passing of Deputy Chief William Frese. Deputy Chief Frese served the City of Wood Dale in various roles during his 21 years of service, including as a Patrol Officer, Detective, Sergeant, and Deputy Chief. During his time with the department, he held numerous specialties, including firearms instructor, use of force instructor, baton instructor, certified gang officer, crime prevention officer, elderly services officer, and certified homicide investigator.

He was not only a leader within our department, but within the greater law enforcement community throughout DuPage County, serving as a member of the Major Crimes Task Force, Incident Management Assistance Team, and most recently as the Deputy Coordinator of Tactical Operations for the M.E.R.I.T. Metro SWAT team.

He was a two-time recipient of the VFW Officer of the Year award and was recognized in 2007 by the Illinois Association of Chiefs of Police as the Officer of the Year.

Before being sworn in as a full-time police officer with Wood Dale, he worked for the Elmhurst Police Department for 14 years, including 5 years as a Community Service Officer and 9 years as a part-time Police Officer.

His impact and legacy in our department and community were immense, and his memory will live on forever. We ask that you keep his family and friends in your thoughts during this difficult time.







While roasted turkey is the more traditional preparation for Thanksgiving, turkey frying is becoming increasingly popular for its ability to produce a juicy and tasty bird! Unfortunately, this cooking method is not without risk, accounting for a significant number of home fires and injuries every year. Turkey frying can be a safe cooking method if done properly and necessary safety precautions are followed. Here are some important things to consider when frying a turkey. We hope everyone has a safe holiday and a delicious meal with family and friends!

KEEP THE WREATH RED

Wood Dale Fire Protection District will hang a holiday wreath decorated with red light bulbs at both of their fire houses. Keep the Wreath Red" program is a visual reminder to residents of the importance of fire safety and prevention, particularly during the holiday season. If a fire should occur during the holiday season because of holiday decorations, one red light bulb will be changed to a white one. Let's be safe this holiday season and "Keep the Wreath Red".

Holiday Decoration Safety

Be careful with holiday decorations.
 Choose decorations that are flame resistant or flame retardant.

 Keep lit candles away from decorations and other things that can burn.

 Some lights are only for indoor or outdoor use, but not both.

◆ Replace any string of lights with worn or broken cords or loose bulb connections. Read manufacturer's instructions for number of light strands to connect.

 Use clips, not nails, to hang lights so the cords do not get damaged.

 Keep decorations away from windows and doors.

What you'll need to fry a turkey:

- Goggles and Hand Protection: Keep in mind that even an experienced turkey fryer can experience oil overheating or splash back. Always wear appropriate hand and eye protection and stand a comfortable distance away from the fryer when adding or removing the turkey.
- Fire Extinguisher: Your Fire Extinguisher should be kept outside near the turkey fryer in the event of fire. Ensure that your fire extinguisher is rated for oil fires (Class B), is fully charged, and understand how to use it.

Where to place the turkey fryer:

- Turkey Fryers should ONLY be used outside:
 This may seem odd, but this does happen. Turkey Fryer's, like grills, should only be used outside.
- Find a place away from structures: When selecting the perfect place for your turkey fryer, you should keep in mind that you want this to be away from structures such as sheds, fences, etc., and out from under eaves, porch roofs, or overhanging tree branches, or on wooden decks. Piles of leaves or other highly combustible materials should be well away from the location of your turkey fryer as well. Essentially, you want to eliminate any potential ignition opportunities in the event of a flare up.
- Your turkey fryer should be placed on a flat, level surface: When in use, your turkey fryer holds a significant amount of scolding hot oil, making a tip or spill hazard very real. For this reason, you want to reduce any likelihood of that happening.
- The propane tank should be at least 2 feet away from the turkey fryer

How can you prepare for Thanksgiving day:

Start with a dry, completely thawed bird:
 Water can cause the hot oil to bubble up and spill over, making it incredibly important to start with a completely thawed. Once thawed, pat down the turkey completely to remove any surface moisture that may still be present.

Safety First:

- Keep the turkey fryer in FULL View while the burner is on: Much like a grill, a turkey fryer should be watched at all times while it is in use.
- Keep children and pets away from the fryer:
 Try to come up with projects or activities to keep kids busy, away from cooking equipment.
- Raise and lower food slowly to reduce splatter and avoid burns: While splatter is more likely when lowering food into the turkey fryer, this can happen at any time and can result in severe burns. Don't forget your safety equipment!
- Check the oil temperature frequently: The oil temperature may increase during the cooking time. By checking regularly, you can adjust the temperature before the oil gets overheated.
- Allow the oil to cool completely: Keep in mind that the oil can remain hot for several hours after use.
- If a fire does start, never use water to put it out: Oil and water do not mix. Use a fire extinguisher rated for oil fires (Class B).

Warning Signs:

 The oil begins to smoke: If any smoke whatsoever is coming from the oil, it is overheated and should be turned down immediately. Overheated oil can ignite and represents a significant fire risk.

ECEC Collaboration with CATCH

In September, ECEC began to receive information from the CATCH (Coordinated Approach to Child Health) Program. Through this program, early childhood students have been learning about healthy foods and eating habits. Students are instructed in ways to identify how some foods are better for us than others. The program groups foods into one of three categories: Go, Slow, or Whoa foods. Students learned that eating "Go" foods is best because this group primarily includes fruits and vegetables. "Slow" foods are foods students can have "sometimes" because these foods are higher in fat and have more sugar and calories. "Whoa" foods are foods students should rarely eat because they are high in fat and sugar and are not very good for their health. At ECEC, our staff provides snacks for our students in the "Go" category. We offer a combination of two different snacks from the five major food groups: Fruits, vegetables, dairy, protein, and grains. The

daily snack is optional, and it is served while students are participating in play centers. During this time, students select what they want to eat while listening to a story or working on a skill. In addition to eating healthy foods, our students are also learning about the importance of being fit and maintaing a healthy body. The District 7 Early Childhood Program requires students to be active for at least 60 minutes per day! Together EC staff and the CATCH program ask families to get involved by reading the health related information sent home. Our ECEC staff encourage families to fully participate in this program to assist their children in building healthy habits for a lifetime.

Westview Students Provide Encouragement to Local Cancer Patients

Recently, students at Westview School painted ceramic tiles to be installed at a local hospital. Several months ago, elementary art teacher Julie Wagner, had someone close to her get diagnosed with breast cancer. While attending chemotherapy treatments for several hours, the friend noticed that the setting looked and felt clinical and drab. She was already facing a challenging situation and concluded the hospital environment should be bright, colorful, and encouraging. So, she reached out to Mrs. Wagner who teaches Art in Wood Dale School District 7 to children from 1st through 5th grades.

First, students were invited to write cards for patients which were brightly colored, and included words of support. Soon, Wagner had acquired 300 ceramic tiles through a donation by the Home Depot in Elk Grove Village. She began engaging students with drafting ideas on paper. Eventually, 3rd-5th grade children at Westview School designed tiles that included words of encouragement, and hopeful pictures. Some of the designs included phrases such as, "You are brave and strong," "Every hour is one hour closer to success," "You can do this," and simply "Hope." Pictures ranged from hearts to ice cream cones, as well as other colorful doodles and scenes.

Grace Botallico, who works with students as a paraprofessional at Westview School, assisted with preparing the tiles for installation by applying a sealant so the mural could withstand being on display in a public area for years to come. She also persuaded her cousin, a professional tile installer to volunteer his time and talents, finalizing the project with a gold painted frame.

When the project was completed 66 tiles were installed on a wall in a large rectangle display in the area where patients undergo chemotherapy treatment. Many additional individual tiles are on display throughout the

department on countertops near the registration desk and at nursing stations. When the tiles were being installed and secured, the busy treatment center came to a standstill as patients, family members, and staff watched what was happening. Many of the employees were moved to tears as the visual display created by Westview students has created a focal point of hope for many in the local community.

Students at Westview designed ceramic tiles with messages of hope and encouragement which were then arranged and installed in the Cancer Treatment Center at Alexian Brothers Hospital.

WDSD 7 Board of Education Goals 2022/23

- ➤ By June 2023, 80% of students that are 3 years old will be able to count at least 5 objects using 1:1 correspondence and match the numerals to the sets.
- By June 2023, 80% of students at Oakbrook and Westview will use at least 2 strategies to compute grade level operations.
- By June 2023, 80% of students at Wood Dale Junior High will score 6 out of 9 on the math writing rubric for operations and algebraic thinking.
- Provide family/parent education information & resources to assist families in supporting their students in increasing average daily attendance to 90% or above.

- ➤ Provide the community with regular reports regarding outcomes for students resulting from the investment of the Elementary & Secondary School Emergency Relief (ESSER) grant money. Specifically in the areas of: 1) Student Achievement, 2) Professional Development & 3) Curriculum.
- Hold community events at the school and district level to re-engage with school families and the community.
- Maintain a Financial Score of Recognition for FY23.
- Expand the use of government purchasing cooperative groups for procurement of goods and services to increase buying power and reduce administrative costs.
- ✓ Use existing funds to complete 60% of the 10 Year Life Safety Priority List by the end of FY23.
- Increase efficiency of district document management through the expanded use of digital technology.
- Use existing funds to complete selected projects from the operations & maintenance plan, to ensure an engaging and safe learning environment for all students and staff.

These goals will drive the work of the Board, administration, teachers, and staff throughout the 2022/23 school year. Many activities are underway in pursuit of these goals and they are discussed at our monthly Board meetings.
