

MAYOR'S LETTER

Dear Wood Dale Residents,

As the new year begins, the City of Wood Dale is excited to keep our connections to the community

strong. We are proud of the many achievements in Wood Dale. This includes welcoming new businesses, building strong infrastructure, receiving grants for various projects, and the success of the City's financial

status in winning the Triple Crown award from the GFOA (Government Finance Officers Association) for the second year in a row.

While we are all striving to do our best, I do have **one** request for the community this new year. My request is to please slow down when driving. The Wood Dale Police Department has received an influx of reported speeding vehicles in neighborhoods.

Speeding in residential areas causes several types of harm:

- It makes citizens fear for safety
- It increases the risk of vehicle crashes
- It increases the seriousness of injuries to a speeder's own passenger(s) and to other drivers and passenger(s), pedestrians, and bicyclists a vehicle strikes

The remedy is simple. Be safe and SLOW DOWN.

Please contact the Wood Dale Police Department regarding speeding in neighborhoods. The first step the Department will take is to conduct a traffic study to determine the volume and speed of vehicles traveling in the area. This traffic study will occur prior to deploying speed awareness signs, extra patrol enforcement, or other measures intended to affect traffic conditions.

The Police Department will deploy the JAMAR Radar Recorder in the area where the complaint was received. The recorder is a radar-based system that can monitor traffic volume and speeds without alerting the traffic that this is being monitored. The results of the speed study will be shared between City departments. The Police Department



then determines the next course of action, which includes the potential addition of speed bumps and speed humps. If a speed study interests you, please contact the Wood Dale Police Department at (630) 766-2060.

The City is working hard to keep you safe and prosperous.



A YEAR IN REVIEW

The City of Wood Dale has covered a lot of ground this last year. We hope you enjoy this brief review of 2022.

CAPITAL STREET IMPROVEMENTS

Street resurfacing:

- The City received a \$3M allocation from State Capital Bill to fund this project.
- Approx. 7 miles of streets were scheduled to be resurfaced.
- This includes the reconstruction of Arlene Drive and Itasca Street.
- This will also provide additional storm sewer and water main improvements





NEW PUBLIC WORKS CAMPUS

Planned Completion 2023:

- The City will consolidate Public Works operations to one facility.
- Rehabilitating the existing facility at 720
 Central Ave, reduces the overall cost when compared to estimates for constructing an all-new building.
- The new campus draws on TIF funds and no tax dollars have been used.
- The project will bring the Utilities Division under the Public Works building.



BUSINESS DEVELOPMENT

Relocation of longtime Wood Dale Favorite - Marino's Restaurant:

- The owners propose at 5,200 square foot, new, stand-alone restaurant, featuring outdoor dining and a wood fired grill.
- The restaurant will be located at the southwest corner of Irving Park Road and Ash Avenue.
- The City initially purchased this property to encourage new investment and redevelopment.
- The project is anticipated to be considered by the City Council in January or February.




Rendering of the new location.

CAPITAL PROJECT

Elizabeth Bridge Project:

- The project is being funded at 80% by the Federal Highway Administration and 20% by local funding.
- The Forest Preserve District is partnering with the City to include a pedestrian path from Addison Road through the Bridge to the Forest Preserve entrance on Elizabeth.
- The project is planned for summer 2024.



NEW WOOD DALE BUSINESSES

- Since January 2022, the City has welcomed 30 New Businesses.
- These businesses support 679 new employees in the community. And occupy 297,890 square feet.
- The City hosted three official ribbon cuttings in 2022.

THE PASSING OF DEPUTY CHIEF WILLIAM FRESE

Deputy Chief Frese served the City of Wood Dale in a variety of roles during his 21 years of service, including as a Patrol Officer, Detective, Sergeant and Deputy Chief. During his time with the department, he held numerous specialties including firearms instructor, use of force instructor, baton instructor, certified gang officer, crime prevention officer, elderly services officer and a certified homicide investigator.

His impact and legacy in our department and community was immense, and his memory will live on forever.

OPPOSITION TO POTENTIAL RAIL MERGER

- In early 2022, Wood Dale and seven other suburban Chicago communities joined together to form the Coalition to Stop CPKC (Canadian Pacific Railway Limited and Kansas City Southern).
- The merger's approval is expected to increase freight traffic on the Milwaukee District West rail line through our communities by up to 300% in three years and contribute negatively to the environment.

INTRODUCTION OF AUTOMATED LICENSE PLATE READER (ALPR) SYSTEMS

A total of 23 ALPR cameras will be installed in strategic locations within Wood Dale. This system will assist Police to:

- Quickly investigate crimes.
- Locate offenders.
- Receive a live alert of the vehicle's location, photo, and direction.
- Apprehend anyone intending to commit a crime.

Access to this data is very strictly audit-controlled & maintained for a 30-day period.



SPECIAL EVENTS

The City hosts special events to promote the celebration of seasons, create new memories, and bring a deeper connection to anyone living and working in Wood Dale. These free family events are planned throughout the year and highlight the fun and beautiful community many call home.

After a two-year pandemic pause, in 2022, we proudly brought back our biggest event, *Prairie Fest*. This 4-day festival included a carnival, free children's activities, musical entertainment with a headliner show, a fantastic fireworks display, and excellent food vendors. Stay tuned for exciting events scheduled for 2023!



MOHAWK MANOR-PHASE 2:

Economic Development is strong in Wood Dale. Plans for Mowhak Manor are shaping up!

- We have a proposed data center on a 24-acre site previously occupied by single-family homes.
- 33 homes were purchased and cleared by the developer.
- Two planned buildings will total approximately 525,000 square feet in area.
- Phase 2 is located on the west side of Route 83, immediately south of Bryn Mawr Avenue, and includes the new Nippon Express building.
- City Council expected to review in early 2023, and construction to follow.

CITY HALL STUDENT FIELD TRIPS RETURN

In October, the City welcomed five classes of second graders from Oakbrook Elementary School visited City Hall as part of their local government curriculum. This was the first time student field trips were initiated since the pandemic. Students toured different departments, met with Alderman Woods to better understand the elected official roles, and got to sit inside a police vehicle.

City staff made an extra effort to include the student field trip in their day. We're so proud of these students! These are the faces of future local government officials and staff, and the future is promising!

TOP DUI ENFORCEMENT OFFICERS AWARDED

RESIDENTIAL DEVELOPMENT



This luxury apartment complex will be located in downtown Wood Dale at the former SBT bank, 372 N Wood Dale Road. Here are some fun facts:

- 5-story building offering 176 luxury apartments.
- Rents range from \$1400/month for a studio and up to \$2400/month for a large 2-bedroom unit.
- The City Council is expected to review it in early 2023.
- Amenities include an outdoor pool and courtyard, an indoor clubroom, a fitness room, and a conference room.
- Groundbreaking is expected in the summer of 2023.



THE CITY INTRODUCED SENIOR/DISABLED GRASS CUTTING DISCOUNT PROGRAM

In 2022, the City of Wood Dale initiated a Senior/Disabled Grass Cutting Program to assist those who need grass-cutting services and cannot complete it independently. The program is based on available funds and is on a first-come, first-serve basis

Services include:

- Spring cleanup
- Cutting of grass
- Edging of hardscape
- Fall cleanup

Wood Dale residents can take advantage of the City's Generator Grant Program, which assists residents with the purchase of a home generator. Generators help keep sump pumps, refrigerators, and other necessary equipment functioning in the event of a power outage. If you are interested in purchasing a generator, you may be eligible for a 50% refund of the purchase price of a portable unit up to \$250, or up to \$400 on a permanent generator. Snow Operations Frequently Asked Questions

WHY DO PLOWS DRIVE SO FAST, ISN'T IT DANGEROUS?

Plow trucks have to move at a certain velocity in order to move the snow off of the roadway. Additionally, the large plow trucks are equipped with governors which won't allow the truck to travel faster than 25 mph while the spreader is turned on.

WHY DO PLOWS PUSH SNOW ONTO MY DRIVEWAY?

Plows actually are not pushing snow onto your driveway, but clearing it from the roadway. Public Works has a responsibility to keep roadways clear to allow safe travel for residents and emergency vehicles. Residents are encouraged to push snow into their parkways, not onto the streets.

WHAT ARE THE LINES IN THE STREETS BEFORE STORMS?

Lines are formed from the distribution a pretreat ice-melt compound called Beet Heet, which is applied to melt snow and prevent ice from forming. This same compound is used to pre-wet salt in order to reduce scatter and enhance its melt capabilities, while utilizing less overall salt in the process.

WHY DO PLOWS APPLY SO LITTLE SALT?

In order to remain cost effective and avoid overburdening waterways with chlorides, equipment is calibrated to apply as minimal amount of salt as possible to effectively treat the roadway. Additionally, a liquid deicer is used as an additive to increase the effect and further decrease the amount of needed salt.

WHY DO YOU WAIT SO LONG TO BEGIN SNOW REMOVAL?

The Public Works Department and Wood Dale Police Department work together to monitor street conditions and mobilize once there is approximately 1" of snow on the roadway. This is the most effective and economical time to begin treatment.

WHY DO YOU SKIP IRVING PARK ROAD?

Irving Park Road, Addison Road, and Wood Dale Road are maintained by other agencies including DuPage County Department of Transportation and Illinois Department of Transportation. The City is restricted against plowing these roadways except in emergency situations.

WHY DO YOU IGNORE CUL-DE-SACS AND DEAD ENDS?

During storm events main collection routes and primary roads are prioritized and plowed first in order keep traffic routes open. After these roads are treated we begin clearing snow from cul-de-sacs and dead ends.

WHEN WILL MAIN SIDEWALKS BE PLOWED?

The City uses specialized equipment to clear strategic sections of sidewalk throughout town during snow events in order to provide safe passage for pedestrians. Sidewalks are typically cleared after 2" of snowfall. The Public Works Department makes every effort to ensure that sidewalks are open for pedestrian travel during work hours, but roadways always take priority.

Snow plow drivers work long hours before, during, and after a snowstorm to clear roads as much as possible. While plow drivers take care of public roads, residents can keep their neighborhoods safe by appropriately clearing sidewalks, driveways, and fire hydrants this winter.

Below are tips homeowners can keep in mind when managing snow and ice on their properties:



1. Sidewalks

Homeowners are responsible for keeping walkways in residential areas safe and clear of snow. Shoveling and the right amount of salt help to keep sidewalks open for students getting to and from school, mail carriers, and other residents walking in the neighborhood.

Shoveling snow before it gets walked on and compressed helps reduce the amount of ice that forms. Be Salt Smart. If you choose to use salt, remember that a 12-ounce cup of salt is enough to cover 10 sidewalk squares. Scatter salt sparsely across the squares so it is not clumped together.

Rock salt stops working when temperatures are below 15°F. Consider switching to a product formulated for colder temperatures if conditions are slippery.





2. Driveways

Snow plow drivers do their best to keep roads passable during the storm and then clear once the storm ends. Unfortunately, as snow is plowed off the streets, it piles up at the end of driveways and crosswalks. Due to the amount of snow, it is impossible to prevent this from happening.

It is the responsibility of the homeowner to clear this snow from the end of the driveway or crosswalk in a safe manner. It is illegal and unsafe for snow or ice to be put back on the road at any time.



3. Fire Hydrants

As plow drivers work to keep our streets safe and clear of snow, we need residents to help remove snow in front of fire hydrants on or near their property. This simple task can help save lives and property in the event of a fire.

Please remember that it is illegal and unsafe to shovel snow back out onto the street. Instead, shovel snow off to the side or behind the hydrant so that easy access can be maintained.

Thank you for doing your part to be Salt Smart and keep our neighborhoods safe during the winter season!

The Conservation Foundation staffs four watershed groups that are working to protect clean water in local rivers and streams. The Conservation Foundation specifically works to reduce the amount of chlorides getting into waterways through the Salt Smart Collaborative, which it coordinates in partnership with the watershed groups and other local partners.



NEW YEAR

NEW SAFETY PLAN

We hope everyone had a happy and healthy 2022. With the start of 2023 we would like to offer some home safety and medical safety tips.

Home Safety

- ► Check HVAC system filters. Some air filters are reusable, while others are disposable and must be replaced. Clean or replace filters when they get dirty, which might be anywhere from 30 days to a few months.
- ► Test smoke and carbon-monoxide detectors. In addition to a monthly test, Consumer Reports explains why you should change batteries every six months. Make a habit of changing the batteries when you change your clocks during Daylight Savings Time.
- ► Trip your GFCI outlets. These can be located anywhere in your home, but are most commonly found close to water sources (bathroom, kitchen, laundry room). Plug a light into the outlet, then click the "test" button to see if the light goes out, then click "reset" and see if the light goes back on. If so, you're good; if not, it's time to replace the outlet.
- ▶ Inspect the fireplace. Always have a professional inspect wood stove and wood burning fireplace chimneys prior to starting the first fire of the season. The Chimney Safety Institute of America reports an average of 22,300 chimney fires each year; a good fireplace and chimney cleaning can help keep your home from becoming a statistic.
- Check your fire extinguisher. At least once per year, check the gauge to see if it is still holding the proper pressure, that its hose in not dry rotted, and the date it was certified or manufactured. Most nonrechargeable fire extinguishers need to be replaced every 10 years.
- ► Clean heat ducts. Accumulated dust and dirt may eventually restrict airflow and might even pose a health hazard. Call in a professional to clean the ducts, as well as repair or upgrade them if necessary. The Department of Energy offers a wealth of information on duct work.

► Clean clothes dryer exhaust. Lint buildup in the dryer vent will affect the dryer's efficiency and may create a fire hazard. In fact, about 15,500 house fires are caused by clothes dryers each year. The National Park Service offers some interesting ideas on what to do with all the lint.

Medical Safety

- ► Update Medical Records. Have a printed medical records sheet with an up-to-date medication list, allergies, and doctors list prepared for emergencies.
- ▶ Dispose of Medication. Dispose of out-of-date medications. This prevents accidental misuse and poisoning. The Wood Dale Police Department is a medication disposal sight.
- ▶ Immunizations. Are you up to date on your shots? Here are some common vaccinations you may need:
 - » Influenza (flu): Everyone 6 months of age and older should get a flu vaccine every year, with rare exceptions. The CDC recommends getting a flu vaccine by the end of October each year.
 - » Pneumococcal (pneumonia): Adults aged 65 and older who are at average risk of pneumonia should receive this one-time vaccine. If you're high-risk, you should get this vaccine sooner and follow-up with revaccination after five years.
 - » Human Papilloma Virus (HPV): All women between ages 11 and 25 should receive this series of three vaccines to prevent Human Papilloma Virus.
 - » Diphtheria/Tetanus/Pertussis: Men and women ages 19 to 64 should receive this one-time vaccine.
 - » Varicella-Zoster: This vaccine. which protects against shingles, is recommended for adults 60 and older. Only a one-time shot is needed.
 - » Covid 19: With all appropriate booster doses.



EARLY CHILDHOOD EDUCATION CENTER

ECEC-EARLY CHILDHOOD EDUCATION CENTER SCREENINGS

During the school year, The Early Childhood Education Center offers preschool screenings for children ages 3, 4, and 5 (before entering Kindergarten). Preschool screenings provide an excellent opportunity for families to have their child's developmental progress assessed in the areas of language (speaking, listening), problem-solving, fine motor skills, coordination, readiness skills, attention, behavior, and socialization. The Early Childhood staff also provides vision and hearing screenings for each child. Results are shared with the parents immediately following the screening. Families may be offered an opportunity to enroll their child in the Early Childhood Program. The Early Childhood Program is offered at no cost for any eligible child whose family resides in Wood Dale District 7.

There is a large body of research that shows children, who attend high-quality preschool programs that target individual strengths and weaknesses, do better in life. Highly qualified preschool teachers and staff are trained to support children in all areas of development through play and positive relationships. Learning how to socialize, take turns, listen to a story, participate in music activities, take off-hang up and put on a coat, figure out how to build connected towers, cut, draw, hop and learn how to play with others are all basic skills for future school success. If deficit areas are noted, early childhood is the best time to address those areas.

Third Grade Students Explore Nature with Mighty Acorns Program

Third Grade students at Westview are participating in the Mighty Acorns program through the Conservation Foundation. Children learn about local natural habitats through hands-on activities and projects both in their classrooms and through field study activities.

This school year, students in 3rd grade at Westview School, are participating in the Mighty Acorns program. Mighty Acorns is an environmental education program that connects 3rd-5th grade students to multiple, meaningful, and sustained interactions with their local ecosystems. The Mighty Acorns program is being provided by the Conservation Foundation, a private notfor-profit land and watershed conservation group based in Naperville. The Conservation Foundation focuses on land preservation and watershed protection in the outlying Chicago counties of DuPage, Kane, Kendall, and Will.

Westview students were offered the opportunity due to our close proximity to some natural habitats, including the easement owned and maintained by Commonwealth Edison along the Prairie Path, just west of the school's campus. Trained facilitators from the Mighty Acorns program began working with the 3rd grade teachers this August to plan a series of classroom lessons, followed by outdoor hands-on activities. This combination of learning experiences

from the classroom to the field help students discover the relationships and interactions in local ecosystems. The activities cover a wide variety of topics, everything from the food web to migration to animal adaptations. Additionally, research shows that adults who spent time outdoors as children may have a greater commitment to environmental issues.

Outdoor field experiences across all seasons are designed to enhance the existing science curriculum, and provide students with opportunities to accomplish the Next Generation Science Standards. Classroom teachers are directly involved with planning and facilitating field work which builds their capacity to teach science concepts using traditional methods in the classroom as well as outdoors, including the nearby Salt Creek Park Forest Preserve.

This spring, program goals include having students participate in a stewardship project installing native prairie habitat as part of restoration management plan in the ComEd right of way.



Focus on Math at Wood Dale **Junior High**

WOOD DALE JUNIOR HIGH SCHO

In today's math classroom instruction looks quite different than what most of us remember. Daily instruction includes the implementation of small group work with an emphasis on student discussion. This process ensures that individual student needs are met and students have the opportunity to discuss and think about various ways math problems can be solved in the real world. A number of steps have been taken to improve math instruction, specifically to meet the needs of students after the pandemic. A full-time junior high math interventionist has been added to the faculty to provide small group instruction for students who find math challenging. In addition some students, exceeding grade level standards, may work with the SEM (Schoolwide Enrichment Model) teacher as part of their small group instruction within the classroom.

The junior high math teachers are taking advantage of professional development opportunities and continue to work on curriculum alignment and instruction. Two instructional coaches, who specialize in math, devote a portion of their time each week to plan and work directly in the classroom with the math teachers. District 7 math teachers will continue to work with Fenton High School math teachers to ensure students have a smooth transition to the high school and that students are engaged with standard-based instruction to help them to be successful in their post-secondary education.

District 7 Receives Federal **Pandemic Funds**

District 7 received federal Elementary and Secondary School Emergency Relief Fund (ESSER) funds would be used to hire additional staff. In the fall of 2021 District 7

added kindergarten through 8th grade Spanish and English intervention teachers to support and increase our instructional coaching staff

The intervention teachers work within the classrooms to provide small group instruction to assist students with reading and/or math. The instruction is targeted to address learning that was interrupted due to the pandemic. Each student in the intervention program has a reading and/or math plan that is specific to their academic goals. The goals are assessed weekly or bi-weekly to monitor progress. Classroom teachers and intervention teachers meet at least every 6 weeks to review and revise each student's goal. All student plans are entered into Otus, an online system available to parents, teachers, and students to review all student achievement and behavior data.

The instructional coaches work with all teachers to support classroom instruction. The coaches plan with teachers, model lessons, develop and present curriculum workshops, review student data to suggest instructional improvements, and consult with district leaders to make changes that will result in students achieving their academic goals.

Current data indicates students are making progress and these additional faculty members are assisting in the district meeting academic goals. Last year, the district set an academic goal for our intervention students and so far we have met or exceeded that goal at each goal reporting period.


Girls Volleyball Sets New School Record
