

#### **MAYOR'S LETTER**

#### Dear Wood Dale Residents,

As we approach the end of another year, I'd like to reflect on the many improvements made in the community.



One example includes the CodeRed initiative, the new community notification system. This high-speed telephone communication service alerts residents and businesses of emergencies, dangerous

weather conditions, City events, and other important information that requires attention. CodeRed replaces and improves our older alert system. See page 6 for more details and be sure to register!

Did you know the Wood Dale Police Department began a multi-year facility Improvement Project? The Police Department building is thirty-four years old and the workspace needs updating to utilize the space more efficiently. For example, the dispatch center, which is no longer in use, continues to use valuable departmental space that could be better utilized. Thus, a space-needs analysis and conceptual study was completed in 2021.

This rehab involves reconfiguring existing workspaces, allowing for a new interview room, employee wellness room, a more extensive training room, and lunchroom. Renovations include expanding the female locker room, as we now have seven female

police officers and seven female civilian police personnel. The building renovations are expected to cost an estimated 2.7 million dollars.





We look forward to providing the police department with an improved workspace that will promote efficiency for officers and civilians. We expect to host a ribbon cutting after the project's completion, which is proposed for spring 2025.

Additionally, this November, please join us as we honor and celebrate all veterans. Two veteran ceremonies are offered in Wood Dale at Veterans Memorial Park at 11 a.m. The first is scheduled for Saturday, November 9, and is co-hosted by the City, Park District, and

Police and Fire Departments to support the VFW and recognize veterans. On Monday, November 11, VFW Tioga 2149 leads a traditional ceremony supported by City staff and community representatives. We hope your schedule allows you to be present at these events, as our veterans have been there for us.

We hope you have enjoyed the Veterans Banners on Irving Park Road this year. If you want to submit a photo of a veteran for display in 2025, please see page seven for an application with details. The City's Veteran Banner Program is another way we share gratitude for the men and women who serve our community and country.

I'm proud to call Wood Dale home. Our small-town charm and economic prosperity make it a wonderful place to live, work, and thrive.




# THE NEW COMMUNITY NOTIFICATION SYSTEM

## Let's Keep Cooking Oil Out of The Sink


The City's Wood Dale for A Greener Tomorrow Committee is excited to partner with SCARCE to bring a cooking oil drop-off location to Wood Dale! The collected cooking oil is then recycled into biodiesel.

The drop-off location is on the south side of the Public Works building at 720 N Central Avenue. There is a bin where citizens may drop off oil containers.

Grease and cooking oil do not belong in residential drains. Even if hot water is running and grease is liquid when it goes down the drain, cooking oils and fats solidify when they reach cold pipes. Cities and homeowners spend thousands of dollars on resulting sewer clogs. Additionally, refuse containers are for solid waste only, so what's a person to do?

Recycle your used cooking oil and turn it into biodiesel! Save your vegetable cooking oil in a container and bring it to a cooking oil recycling location or special event. Sites only accept liquid, vegetable-based cooking oil — no animal fats (i.e., those solid at room temperature).

Thanks to a grant from the DuPage Foundation, SCARCE has been able to help communities establish permanent cooking oil collection sites. Contact the Wood Dale Public Works Department for more information at 630-350-3530.









## **Snow Operations Frequently Asked Questions**

NOTE THAT PARKING ON STREETS 48 HOURS FOLLOWING A 2" OR GREATER SNOWFALL IS PROHIBTED.

#### WHY DO PLOWS DRIVE SO FAST, ISN'T IT DANGEROUS?

Plow trucks have to move at a certain velocity in order to move the snow off of the roadway. Additionally, the large plow trucks are equipped with governors which won't allow the truck to travel faster than 25 mph while the spreader is turned on.

#### WHY DO PLOWS PUSH SNOW ONTO MY DRIVEWAY?

Plows actually are not pushing snow onto your driveway, but clearing it from the roadway. Public Works has a responsibility to keep roadways clear to allow safe travel for residents and emergency vehicles. Residents are encouraged to push snow into their parkways, not onto the streets.

#### WHAT ARE THE LINES IN THE STREETS BEFORE STORMS?

Lines are formed from the distribution a pretreat ice-melt compound called Beet Heet, which is applied to melt snow and prevent ice from forming. This same compound is used to pre-wet salt in order to reduce scatter and enhance its melt capabilities, while utilizing less overall salt in the process.

#### WHY DO PLOWS APPLY SO LITTLE SALT?

In order to remain cost effective and avoid overburdening waterways with chlorides, equipment is calibrated to apply as minimal amount of salt as possible to effectively treat the roadway. Additionally, a liquid deicer is used as an additive to increase the effect and further decrease the amount of needed salt.

#### WHY DO YOU WAIT SO LONG TO BEGIN SNOW REMOVAL?

The Public Works Department and Wood Dale Police Department work together to monitor street conditions and mobilize once there is approximately 1" of snow on the roadway. This is the most effective and economical time to begin treatment.

#### WHY DO YOU SKIP IRVING PARK ROAD?

Irving Park Road, Addison Road, and Wood Dale Road are maintained by other agencies including DuPage County Department of Transportation and Illinois Department of Transportation. The City is restricted against plowing these roadways except in emergency situations.


#### WHY DO YOU IGNORE CUL-DE-SACS AND DEAD ENDS?

During storm events main collection routes and primary roads are prioritized and plowed first in order keep traffic routes open. After these roads are treated we begin clearing snow from cul-de-sacs and dead ends.

#### WHEN WILL MAIN SIDEWALKS BE PLOWED?

The City uses specialized equipment to clear strategic sections of sidewalk throughout town during snow events in order to provide safe passage for pedestrians. Sidewalks are typically cleared after 2" of snowfall. The Public Works Department makes every effort to ensure that sidewalks are open for pedestrian travel during work hours, but roadways always take priority.

# Senior/Disabled Snow Removal

#### Qualified Discount Program

The City of Wood Dale has initiated a Snow Removal Assistance Program to assist community members who need additional help with snow removal services and/or who do not have the means to complete it on their own. The program will be limited based on available funds and on a first-come, first-served basis for those who qualify.

#### **ABOUT THE PROGRAM**

The City has obtained a private contractor to fulfill the services specified in this program. The City will subsidize the cost per visit at 50% based on your property. Please note that pricing is the resident's share per service.

Snow removal services will be initiated when two inches of snow has fallen. The contractor will wait until the storm is complete to remove snow. It may take several hours before your property has been completed. If there is heavy accumulation and the contractor has to make repeated trips, it will result in further charges for those services.

#### **SERVICES INCLUDE:**

- Removal of snow from hardscape at the front or side of the corner property of the property.
- No salting or deicer will be used.

#### PRICING\*:

- Corner lot with sidewalk \$25.00
- Lot with sidewalk \$20.00
- Lot with no sidewalk \$15.00
- \*The listed pricing is from 2023 and is subject to change.

The application deadline for Winter 2024 is NOVEMBER 25, 2024.

Building permits are essential for interior remodels to ensure that construction work meets safety standards and is carried out by licensed professionals. They also help protect property values and maintain the value in your investment.


#### **How to Obtain a Permit:**

# Residential Rental Property Registration in Wood Dale

Did you know the City of Wood Dale requires all residential rental properties to be registered? Any rental residential properties, including apartments, condos, townhomes, or single-family residences, must be registered to protect the health, safety and welfare of the residents of Wood Dale. Short-term rentals like Airbnb's and VRBO's must also be registered. This registration is completed on an annual basis.

#### The following items are required to obtain the residential rental certificate:

- Registration: complete the Rental Property Registration application through the City's convenient self-service portal at <u>my.wooddale.com</u> (or scan the QR Code).
- Inspection: annual inspections of rental properties are crucial for ensuring the safety of residents, preventing or correcting poor housing conditions, and upholding minimum property maintenance standards.
- **Certification:** upon a successful inspection, a Rental License Certificate will be issued to the property owner through the My Wood Dale portal.

#### C.A.L.E.A. Conference

Since 2001, the Wood Dale Police Department has been a fully accredited agency by the National Commission on Accreditation for Law Enforcement Agencies, Inc. (C.A.L.E.A.).

C.A.L.E.A. was created in


1979 as a credentialing authority through the joint efforts of law enforcement's significant executive associations. It is reserved for use by public safety agencies that have demonstrated excellence in leadership, resource management, and service delivery.

On July 27th, during the C.A.L.E.A. Summer Conference, Planning & Research Analyst Chrissie Sobanski and Chief of Police Chris Zito participated in a public review hearing facilitated by a panel of C.A.L.E.A. Commissioners. The Review Committee analyzed the Department's remote assessments conducted in 2021, 2022, and 2023 and the onsite evaluation conducted earlier this year in Wood Dale. The Review Committee discussed the findings of our assessments over the past four years and asked questions about the areas of focus the City highlighted: Adjudication, Community Involvement, Evidence & Property, and Training.

We are happy to announce that after the review hearing, the Review Committee passed a motion recommending that the Wood Dale Police Department be recertified with C.A.L.E.A. for Advanced Law Enforcement Accreditation. Pictured is the Wood Dale Police Department accreditation award from C.A.L.E.A. Only 5% of law enforcement agencies in the United States and 4% in Illinois have accreditation from C.A.L.E.A.

This significant milestone is a testament to the Department's dedication, professionalism, and unwavering commitment to excellence in law enforcement. The rigorous process of obtaining C.A.L.E.A. accreditation reflects the Department's highest standards and pursuit of continuous improvement. This accomplishment enhances the credibility and effectiveness of the Wood Dale Department and also reinforces our unwavering dedication to providing exceptional service to our community.

Members of the Wood Dale Police Department understand that accreditation is not a one-time achievement, but an ongoing commitment to excellence. We are proud to be a C.A.L.E.A. accredited law enforcement agency, as it underscores our dedication to continually improving the way we keep the Wood Dale community and our department members safe.



#### **Happy Thanksgiving!**



While roasted turkey is the more traditional preparation for Thanksgiving, turkey frying is becoming increasingly popular for its ability to produce a juicy and tasty bird!

Unfortunately, this cooking method is not without risk, accounting for a significant number of home fires and injuries every year.

Turkey frying can be a safe cooking method if done properly and necessary safety precautions are followed. Here are some important things to consider when frying a turkey.

We hope everyone has a safe holiday and a delicious meal with family and friends!

#### What you'll need to fry a turkey:

- · Goggles & Hand Protection: Keep in mind that even an experienced turkey fryer can experience oil overheating or splash back. Always wear appropriate hand and eye protection and stand a comfortable distance away from the fryer when adding or removing the turkey.
- Fire Extinguisher: Your Fire Extinguisher should be kept outside near the turkey fryer in the event of fire. Ensure that your fire extinguisher is rated for oil fires (Class B), is fully charged, and understand how to use it.

#### Where to place the turkey fryer:

 Turkey Fryers should ONLY be used outside: This may seem odd, but this does happen. Turkey Fryer's, like grills, should only be used outside.

- · Find a place away from structures: When selecting the perfect place for your turkey fryer, you should keep in mind that you want this to be away from structures such as sheds, fences, etc., and out from under eaves, porch roofs, or overhanging tree branches, or on wooden decks. Piles of leaves or other highly combustible materials should be well away from the location of your turkey fryer as well. Essentially, you want to eliminate any potential ignition opportunities in the event of a flare up.
- Your turkey fryer should be placed on a flat, level surface: When in use, your turkey fryer holds a significant amount of scolding hot oil, making a tip or spill hazard very real. For this reason, you want to reduce any likelihood of that happening.

Water can cause the hot oil to bubble up and spill over, making it incredibly important to start with a completely thawed. Once thawed, pat down the turkey completely to remove any surface moisture that may still be present.

If a fire does start, never use water to put

it out: Oil and water do not mix. Use a fire extinguisher rated for oil fires (Class B) & move to safety and call 9-1-1.

## **Bringing Back Student Play and Kindess**

This year District 7 and Oakbrook School are focused on reducing student exposure to social media. According to research, exposure to social media before the age of 16 can prove harmful to students. Engaging with social media at young ages negatively impacts children's abilities to develop meaningful and safe relationships with others. This year Oakbrook School plans to provide opportunities for families to engage with their children in ways that do not require the use of technology. Our first activity was held prior to school starting and involved our Early Childhood Education Center and Oakbrook School principals joining together to host a playdate for students from both schools. Families gathered together to allow children to meet new friends and play at the Oakbrook School playground! We had a great turnout, and the event reminded families that ensuring opportunities for their child to play with other children is a great way for students to grow socially and physically.

We also began the school year with staff using consistent expectations and procedures across the building. Students are learning expressions inspired by the book, "A Bug & A Wish". The book suggests sentence starters for students to use when they are bothered or upset, for example, "It bugs me when..." or "I wish..." Additionally, staff conducted Rules Rotations Stations for students the first week of school. Each classroom rotated to different parts of the school to hear adults explain the rules and procedures to follow for each area of the building, such as the bathroom, office, or hallway. We are hopeful that our efforts to reintroduce natural play, and teach students the importance of making good choices and demonstrating appropriate behavior, will set them on the path of becoming responsible young citizens.

Beginning this fall, we turned to those with the most expertise on the subject—our 5th grade students who have been here the longest!

After generating questions in small groups and full classes, our 3rd graders scripted a plan for conducting interviews with the 5th graders. Teachers facilitated the drafting of questions based on the various spaces throughout the school, such as the library, playground, cafeteria, Art Studio, Music Room, and of course the gym! Then, students worked in teams to determine what they really wanted to know about those spaces. After practicing other relevant skills such as taking notes when a person is answering, the 3rd grade students traveled to a 5th grade classroom to conduct their interviews. Fifth grade students had the opportunity to tell 3rd grade students about school traditions such as monthly Character Cafe celebrations, all-school assemblies in the gym, as well as how we celebrate holidays throughout the year.

#### **Advisory Matters at the Junior High!**

At the junior high, there is a daily class you may not know about. Most people are familiar with math, language arts, and physical education but what is this mystery class? It is called advisory! Advisory is the first class of the day for all junior high students, and lasts for a little over 30 minutes. The purpose of advisory class is to provide students with a consistent environment to get off to a great start every morning. Advisory class sizes are smaller than other classes, which allows students a better opportunity to make a closer connection to their advisory teacher. Each week, the advisory teacher checks in with individual students in their class to monitor their performance in areas such as academics and social emotional status. If the advisory teacher notices any issues, or dips in performance, they will then consult with other teachers. the social worker, administration, and if necessary parents to develop a plan to assist the student in getting back on track.

During advisory, other important topics that impact adolescents such as peer relationships, bullying, social media use, and internet safety are discussed. During these lessons, real life examples are presented to students and they are then provided time to collaborate in small

groups to come up with solutions to these situations. Students from 8th grade advisory classes are paired up with 6th grade classes to provide mentoring designed to assist the 6th graders in adjusting to the junior high. Advisory class time is also used to hold whole school assemblies and celebrations throughout the school year. Assemblies are held for end of trimester celebrations or to address and discuss other topics that are of interest to junior high students. Assistant Principal, Ms. DiFiglio, along with a team of five teachers work together to generate topics and create lessons for advisory classes. This committee strives to create interesting and informative lessons that lead to student reflection and conversation. The goal of advisory is to arm our students with information that will assist them in making better decisions when they are faced with difficult real life situations. •

#### **District 7 Board of Education** Takes a Stand on Social Media

A message from Dr. John Corbett, Superintendent

In the spring of 2024 the Wood Dale Board of Education held discussions regarding the dangers the use of social media platforms present to elementary aged students. As a result of these discussions the Board of Education wrote and adopted



a statement recommending parents not allow their children to use social media. Please see the statement below that has been included in the District 7 Parent/Student Handbook.

District 7 strongly recommends families delay their child's use of social media platforms until they enter high school. The Children's Online Privacy Protection Act (COPPA) has established 13 as the minimum age for children to begin to use most social media sites. However, the US Surgeon General, Dr. Vivek Murthy, stated he believes 13 is too young for children to be on social media platforms because at 13 children are still "developing their identity."

In June of 2023, Dr. Murthy issued an advisory about social media's impact on youth mental health. It notes that while social media can provide benefits for some children and youth, there is a growing body of research about potential harms social media use poses. Children and adolescents on social media are commonly exposed to extreme, inappropriate, and harmful content and frequent social media use can contribute to poor mental health, including depression and anxiety. The advisory outlines action steps that families can take to mitigate the risk of harm and make social media safer and healthier for children and youth. (The complete advisory is available online.)

While it is beyond the scope of the district's authority to decide when parents allow their children to begin to use social media, we strongly recommend against the use of social media until high school. Should disciplinary situations arise at school involving student use of social media, please expect district staff to discuss the recommendation of parents removing their child from social media as part of the resolution.

It is the intention of District 7 to support families in this goal of their children not using social media. Additionally, we are focusing on encouraging families to reduce overall screen time for our students. The administration and staff will be presenting information and options for students and families regarding this important issue throughout the school year. Personal interaction with other children is much healthier than using social media. We are committed to getting that message out to our families and supporting them in finding ways for our students to make more personal connections with one another. •
