#### **MAYOR'S LETTER**

#### **Dear Wood Dale Residents,**

#### The Public Works Facility Improvements Project

As the spring season gets closer every day, new interest in Wood Dale, new construction, and exciting new developments in the City grow. We're excited about this season and the sound changes that come with it.

On February 3, 2022, the City hosted a groundbreaking event at the site of the Public Works Facility Improvements Project (790 Central Ave). The event was well attended by members of the City Council, staff, consultants, and representatives from the various taxing bodies and included a tour of the facility.

This project addresses longstanding needs for the Public Works Department, including improved amenities, additional indoor parking for vehicles and equipment, new material storage bins and salt dome, and bringing the Public Works Administration, Streets, and Utilities Division under one roof. The project has been in various planning stages for several years, and space needs were evaluated for present and future operations.

While several concepts were considered, the City was fortunate enough to have the opportunity to acquire the parcel directly next door to their current facility. The property consists of an existing office building and a large yard area. Renovating the two existing facilities and constructing a new vehicle storage building and ancillary structures on the yard storage area allow the City to recognize cost savings of as much as \$9-12 million dollars compared to building a new facility from the ground-up.

Phase I of the existing office building renovations have commenced in February 2022, with completion anticipated in June 2022. Phase II involves the rehabilitation of the existing Public Works Facility, construction of the new vehicle storage building, and site renovations and is expected to commence in Spring 2022 with completion in early 2023. As both facilities lie within the existing TIF district, the use of TIF funding is appropriate, and no alternative revenue sources will be necessary, saving the taxpayers from further expenses.

We're also pleased to share that special events planning is underway for the 2022 season, including summer concerts and movies in the Park. We're also excited to share that after a two-year pandemic pause, Prairie Fest is returning. Mark your calendars for July 28 through July 31, 2022!

As always, the City Council is dedicated to meeting the needs of residents and thoughtfully improving Wood Dale. We're excited to see what the future holds for the City.



# COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT

As we move toward longer days and warmer weather, many of us may be thinking of home repair projects or renovations. The Community Development Department is available to assist with the permitting process to ensure your project is done safely and accurately.

#### What work requires a building permit?

A permit is required for any alteration or repair of a current building or new build. Examples of work that would require a building permit are; new window installation, building a deck, water heater replacement, and driveway replacement. While most projects require a permit, the following projects are exempt and do not require a permit:

- Painting, papering, tiling, carpeting, cabinets, countertops;
- Non-fixed and movable fixtures, cases, racks, counters, and partitions not over five feet nine inches (5'9") in height which do not contain electrical devices;
- Prefabricated swimming pools which are capable of holding less than twenty-four inches (24") of water, do not exceed five thousand (5,000) gallons, and are installed entirely above ground;
- One-story detached accessory structures used as playhouses provided the floor area does not exceed one hundred twenty (120) square feet; and
- Swings and other playground equipment.

The City's website offers a guide on how to apply for a permit through the self-service portal, **my.wooddale.com**. The website also provides information about simple, same-day permits, such as roof, siding, water heater, window, and furnace replacement. Please note permit applications are only being accepted through the self-service portal at this time.

- you are using a de-icing salt should be thoroughly thawed **and then irrigated out.** Salt can damage the roots of the tree.
- 2. Remove dead plant material such as dead leaves, dead branches, and old mulch from around the tree.
- 3. Edge planting beds in preparation for new mulch. The mulch should not be any deeper than 3 to 4 inches and 2 to 3 inches away from the trunk to allow the tree's base to be exposed. This will ensure that moisture escapes reducing the growth of fungi and minimizing decay.
- 4. Inspect and check trees and shrubs.
  - If one area of the tree looks sparse, this could signify that your tree is under stress. This can be caused by insects, disease, drought, or even soil compaction.
  - Yellowing leaves could occur from excess water from the winter and spring or indicate poor soil drainage.
  - Decaying wood that is cracking or breaking could signify insects and disease.



#### TREE CITY USA

The City was recently notified by the Illinois Department of Natural Resources that it was awarded the Illinois Tree City USA status for the seventeenth year in a row and the Growth Award for its seventh straight year. The Tree City USA status is awarded by the Arbor Day Foundation and provides a framework to organizations to maintain and grow their tree population and health. The Growth Award builds upon this framework and is awarded to organizations that exceed the Tree City USA qualifications.

#### **LOCAL FLOOD** INFORMATION

The principal flood problems in Wood Dale are in the low-lying area caused by the overflow of Salt Creek. As a result, storm drain outfalls become blocked, and areas along small tributaries are flooded. The blocked storm runoff infiltrates the sanitary sewer system, creating severe overloads and subsequent basement backups.

#### WHAT IS A FLOOD?

A Flood is defined in the Standard Flood Insurance Policy as a general and temporary condition of partial or completed inundation of normally dry land areas from overflow of inland or tidal waters or the unusual and rapid accumulation or runoff of surface waters from any source.

#### WHAT DOES A FLOOD MAP TELL YOU?

On all flood maps will find Flood Insurance Risk Zone Designations. These designations indicate the degree of the flood hazard in specific areas of a community. The definitions are:

Zone A - Special Flood Hazard Areas inundated by the 100 year flood; base flood elevations are not determined.

Zone AE - Special Flood Hazard Areas inundated by the 100 year flood; based flood elevations are not determined.

**Zone X** - Areas determined to be outside the 500 year floodplain.

These are the zones in which Wood Dale has been designated. If you have any question about what zone you are in, would like to see a flood zone map, or have questions about flooding and flood insurance, you can contact public works at, (630) 787-3764. Also you can view the maps at, https://msc.fema.gov/portal.

#### **FLOOD INSURANCE**

What types of property may be insured against flood loss? Almost every walled or roofed building that is principally above ground and not entirely over water may be insured if it is in a participating community in the National Flood Insurance Program, of which Wood Dale is. Contents also may be insured under separate coverage.

How is flood insurance purchased? After a community joins the NFIP, a policy may be purchased from any licenses property insurance agent.

What are the steps leading to the purchase of flood insurance? A property owner perceives a risk of flooding an decides to purchase flood insurance OR a lender making a mortgage informs the builder or potential buyer that the building is in a Special Flood Hazard Area and that flood insurance must be purchased as required by the Flood Disaster Protection Act of 1973. Then the home owner would contact an insurance agent for purchase of a policy.

How does a policyholder file a flood loss claim?

The home owner should immediately report flood loss to their insurance agent. The insured must file a "proof of loss" within 60 days.

#### FREQUENTLY ASKED QUESTIONS

#### Who is eligible for the program?

The Rear Yard Drainage Assistance Program is available to all Wood Dale residents and non-profit organizations. This includes single and multi-family homeowners, as well as townhome or condominium associations within City limits. Each property may take advantage of the program one time.

#### What are the reimbursement amounts?

Eligible projects will be reimbursed at 50% of the total project cost up to a maximum City-share of \$3,000.

#### What is the typical cost of a rear yard drainage project?

Projects typically range from \$1,500 to \$15,000 depending on the type and complexity of the project.

#### What types of projects are eligible?

The most common recommendation is installation of a rear yard drain connected to the City's storm sewer system, however other project types including dry wells, swales, and other green infrastructure improvements may be recommended. Connection of sump pump discharges to the City's storm sewer system are also eligible.

#### Are there any costs to participate?

There are no upfront costs for resident participation. The site visit performed by a stormwater engineer and associated report are paid for by the City. If a project is selected, the resident is required to pay the contractor in full and submit proof of payment to the City for reimbursement. Applicable permit fees apply.

#### Can the City recommend a contractor?

While the City does not recommend any individual contractor, a list of contractors registered with the City may be obtained from either the Community Development or Public Works Departments. These contractors have submitted their proper licenses and certificates of insurance and are in good standing with the City. Residents are encouraged to perform their own due diligence when selecting a contractor as well.

#### Am I required to obtain a building permit?

Yes, a Drainage Permit must be obtained from the Community Development Department. Standard inspection and permit fees apply.

#### The City Updates the City Code for Parking Over Sidewalks

City Council has approved an amendment to City Code section 15.1303 regarding parking a vehicle that extends over a sidewalk.

Previously, no vehicle could extend over a sidewalk at any time during the day. To accommodate residents who have vehicles that may need to utilize this space to park their vehicles overnight, and also to acknowledge that pedestrians need to have safe passage on sidewalks during the day, the new ordinance that allows for this parking from 9:00 pm until 6:00 am every night.

During the day, vehicles parked over the sidewalk will continue to be in violation. We ask that residents be considerate of their neighbors who utilize the sidewalks and ensure that if you are parked over the sidewalk in the overnight hours, the vehicle is moved promptly in the morning.

#### Solicitors in Wood Dale — What You Should Know

The City and Police Department frequently receives inquires from residents with questions about solicitors throughout the year. Please know that the courts have ruled that municipalities cannot put broad prohibitions against all types of soliciting but can enact reasonable restrictions that govern these activities.

In 2016, the City Council approved some additional changes and new registration procedures for solicitors. These new restrictions require solicitors who want to be "approved" by the City to undergo a background check and carry photo identification provided by the City, designating them as approved solicitors.

In addition, the City Council reduced soliciting hours during the months with shorter days (October-March) to between

the hours of 9:00 am to 6:00 pm. During the summer months (April to September), solicitors can solicit from 9:00 am to 8:00 pm.

Residents can prevent solicitors from coming to their door in two ways. The first is to post a sign saying "NO SOLICITORS ALLOWED." If this sign is posted, you are letting solicitors know that even if they are registered with the City, you do not want anyone coming to your door to sell commercial items or services. Violators will be issued citations for these infractions if the Police Department is contacted and finds these solicitors in violation of the posting.

The other option is to post a sign saying, "ONLY SOLICITORS REGISTERED WITH THE CITY OF WOOD DALE ARE INVITED." If this sign is posted, you permit those who have pre-registered with the City to come to your residence. Suppose any other commercial solicitor comes to your door that has not registered with the City. In that case, violators will be issued citations for these infractions if the Police Department is contacted and finds these solicitors in violation of the posting.

Stickers are available to residents free of charge at the City Clerk's office

and can be picked up during business hours. Residents can also create signs indicating their preference regarding

solicitors. WITHOUT ONE OF THESE SIGNS OR STICKERS BEING POSTED. THE POLICE DEPARTMENT CAN NOT ENFORCE ANY INFRACTIONS AGAINST SOLICITORS. It is not against the law for solicitors to go to your door if you do not take an active step to indicate your preference for solicitations.

While these local ordinances provide us with guidance regarding commercial, for-profit soliciting, there are no restrictions on free speech activities such as political candidates/committees religious organizations going door-to-door to share their solicitation of political



support or religious message. In addition, these ordinances do not apply to not-for-profit groups or those under 17 years of age selling items for their local sports or community organization.

Stickers can be picked up at the City Clerk's Office, which is located on the second floor of City Hall. Office hours are Monday through Friday, from 8:30 am to 4:30 pm.





**JOE GIOMETTO**

#### **Police Retirements**

CONGRATULATIONS to Deputy Chief Ryan O'Neil, Sergeant Mike Peters, and Manager Craig Celia on their retirements from the Wood Dale Police Department.

Deputy Chief Ryan O'Neil has been with the department since 2002. He started as a Patrol Officer. was promoted to Sergeant in 2017, and was named Deputy Chief of Operations in 2019. After serving as an undercover agent and supervisor with DuMEG, he served as Wood Dale's K9 unit with his partner Laika for 7.5 years. Ryan has been an integral part of the department and has been an ambassador in the community for his entire career. Whenever Ryan received a gift card, he always paid it forward to someone he met on a police call or that he ran into and felt needed it more than himself. When asked for his final thoughts, he responded, "Best memory was being blessed with the opportunities to participate in numerous events with

the community including K-9 demos, Police Night Out, Shop with a Cop, Cops, and Bobbers, etc. over the years." Ryan will miss the opportunity to build meaningful partnerships with the citizens and businesses in town, along with his fellow co-workers.

Sergeant Mike Peters started with Wood Dale in 1997 as a patrol officer and then became an undercover agent with DuMEG. After returning from that assignment, he served several years in the Investigations Division as a Detective before being promoted to Sergeant in 2011. During that time, he was very involved with managing the department traffic grants and acting as liaison to homeowner associations; he completed his career as the dayshift Watch Commander. His favorite memory came early in his career. While on a call, he observed a group of kids playing baseball in front of the building. After handling the call, he joined the kids for a quick pick-up ball game. That moment made him realize he had made the right choice to become a police officer. He has met residents

and formed strong relationships in the Wood Dale throughout his career. He also will miss working with his fellow officers.

Support Services Manager Craig Celia started with Wood Dale in 2001 as a Telecommunicator in our former Dispatch Center. He was promoted to Supervisor in 2005 and then to Manager of Support Services shortly after. #### SPRING FIRE SAFETY TIPS

It's easy to associate at-home fire protection with the colder months with the use of space heaters. fireplaces, decorative candles, and tangled strings of holiday lights. But, just because we're less inclined to turn the heat on doesn't mean we shouldn't still be vigilant when it comes to protecting ourselves and our property from fire hazards. As you transition from sweaters to shorts, deep fryers to grills, and indoor holiday parties to backyard barbecues, keep an eye on these areas:



Fire is unavoidable when it comes to preparing the perfect kabob or rack of ribs on the grill, which means you've got some inherent risks right from the get-go. In fact, the NFPA reports that an average of 8,900 home fires are caused by grilling each year. Here are some fire safety tips for the

- While the meat is marinating, be sure to check each potentially problematic point of the grill including the propane tank, the hose, and all connecting points.
- Charcoal should be soaked with charcoal starter fluid
- ▶ Make sure the grill is clean. Failing to clean the grill before and after use is a contributing factor in nearly 20% of all grill structure fires.
- Make sure the grill is set up in an open, outdoor area with nothing flammable (plants, paper products, etc.) nearby.



The necessary safety precautions for an OUTDOOR FIRE PITS outdoor fire pit (s'mores, anybody?) are much the same as for a grill, plus a few others:

- Never leave young children unattended near a fire in the pit.
- Fill a bucket with water and set it next to the pit before you even begin building the fire.
- Avoid throwing leaves, pinecones, pine needles and paper into the fire. They catch fire quickly and can result in dangerous floating embers.
- ▶ Unless there's an emergency, avoid dumping the entire bucket of water on the fire to put it out. Instead, spread the pieces of fuel as far apart as possible and gently sprinkle water over them until there are no more glowing embers. This prevents the scatter of embers and a thick cloud of smoke.
- Toast your marshmallows over the embers rather than the flames. This not only gives them that perfect golden crust, but prevents them from catching on fire.



#### **Embracing Extracurricular Programs Throughout Pandemic**

While the last few years have been challenging for all families, we know our students thrive when their learning opportunities extend beyond the four walls of the classroom. At Westview School, students at 3rd, 4th, and 5th grades have an opportunity to participate in our Art Club. This club is sponsored by our Art Teacher and provides children an opportunity to explore media and techniques not typically used within the grade level curriculum. Due to high demand, students are invited

to participate in this club as part of a group that meets for several weeks while completing a project. In order to provide an opportunity for other students to participate, another group of children are then invited to participate for the next several weeks. Students participate during their recess and/or lunch period throughout the school year.

Children who enjoy music have an opportunity to join both the Beginning Band and Chorus starting in 4th grade. At various events throughout the year, the chorus has an opportunity to perform for a live audience such as the District 7 Winter Choral Concert, Spring Open House, and more. Our District 7 Band Director provides small group lessons organized by instrument during each week, in addition to full ensemble rehearsals which we have recently resumed. These students also perform at concerts during the year, and get to observe future opportunities that await, when they enjoy performances by older students at Wood Dale Junior High.

#### **Intervention Program to Address Learning Loss**



From the Curriculum Director Dr. Merri Beth Kudrna

As part of District 7's proactive approach to assisting students with unfinished learning due to the pandemic, we invested a portion of our ESSER 3 funding from the Federal Government in hiring additional kindergarten through 8th grade Spanish and English intervention teachers and an instructional coaches focused on the Multi-Tiered System of Support (MTSS) and unfinished learning programs.

The intervention teachers work within the classrooms to provide small group instruction to assist students with reading and/ or math. The instruction is targeted to address learning that was interrupted due to the pandemic. Each student in the intervention program has a reading and/or math plan that is specific to their

academic goals. The goals are assessed weekly or bi-weekly to monitor progress. Classroom teachers and intervention teachers meet at least every 8 weeks to review and revise each student's goal. All student plans are entered into Otus, an online system available to parents, teachers, and students to review all student achievement and behavior data.

The instructional coach works with the intervention teachers to support them with unfinished learning and the MTSS process. The coach models lessons for teachers, ensures that policies and

procedures for the MTSS program are followed, reviews student data to suggest program improvements, and consults with district leaders to make changes that will result in students achieving their academic goals.

Current data indicates students are making progress and these interventions are working. The district set a goal for our MTSS program: by the 8 week intervention reporting period 70% of the intervention students' will have met or exceeded their individual student goal. At the November Board of Education meeting, it was reported that 95% of students met or exceeded their reading goal and 96% of students met or exceeded their

math goal during the first 8 week intervention period. These are desirable results and we are hopeful these interventions will continue to provide students with the support they need to be successful!

#### Dear Fenton Families and valued community partners,

Everyone who reads this letter has a huge opportunity to dramatically improve the futures of our children and our children's children, but that opportunity comes with big decisions.

I'll get right to the point: our Board of Education is deliberating on some very meaningful construction options, and come June you might see a question on the ballot. Please get informed, ask questions, and help move our school forward.

Make no mistake, our students at Fenton High School are successful. Our staff is highly qualified and passionate. But our learning spaces are far too old and antiquated. A majority of our building was originally constructed in the 1950s and based around learning models from the 1950s. Other portions were built in the 1970s - still almost 50 years ago.

This building served our community well for many years. Alumni often visit and relive nostalgic memories. However, Fenton alums should also come home to see progress and evolution.

Our students should race past "successful" and become innovative leaders who set the bar high above their peers at other DuPage high schools. Our students and teachers need facilities that can accommodate 21st Century Learning. Many, many of our students are capable of higher goals and greater challenges, but instead have to watch other schools achieve it. Our kids

deserve better. Bensenville and Wood Dale deserve to be on the cutting edge.

This is not wishful thinking. Since 2019 Fenton's administration has carefully evaluated and audited the state of our facility, how it's used, and the many Band Aids we slap onto problems that are too big to be solved without large investments.

We have a huge opportunity to address both issues at the same time: keeping pace with the new era of education and resolving critical deficiencies in our physical building.

I can't underscore this enough: Fenton High School belongs to you, the residents of Bensenville and Wood Dale. My professional opinion is to accept this bold challenge and build a brighter future for our kids. The decision, however, is ultimately yours.

All requested money would only go toward construction expenses, and the accrued debt would be paid off over 20 years or more.

The community was invited to a wide array of public meetings throughout October, November, December, and January to review our potential options. Phone surveys, though sometimes inconvenient, connected with others in our community to collect feedback.

Whatever happens will be a result of communitywide collaboration.
